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Explanations

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1. Play the notes an octave higher or lower than where they are written.

A. Octave sign

B. Mordent

C. Marcato

D. Opus

An octave sign tells you to shift the written pitches by an octave. It's shown as 8va (ottava alta) for playing higher, or 8vb (ottava bassa) for playing lower, often with a line indicating how long the shift lasts and ending where loco cancels or at the end of the line. This marking lets you change the pitch range without rewriting the notes. The other terms refer to different ideas: mordent is a quick ornamental turn, marcato is a strong, accented articulation, and opus is a cataloging term for a work. So the instruction to play an octave higher or lower exactly describes the octave sign.

2. What term describes major and minor keys that share the same key signature?

Major and minor keys that use the same key signature are described as relative major and minor. In this relationship, each key has a counterpart in the opposite mode that shares the exact signature: the major key's relative minor starts on the sixth degree of the major scale, and the minor key's relative major is reached by moving up a major third. For example, C major and A minor share no sharps or flats; G major and E minor share one sharp; E-flat major and C minor share three flats. The other terms in the options are tempo or mood markings and don't pertain to key signatures. So the term that describes major and minor keys sharing the same key signature is relative major/minor.

Tempo change markings guide how the music feels in time. This item asks which term shows a gradual slowing of tempo. Rallentando communicates a deliberate, ongoing deceleration—tempo slows down gradually over a passage, producing a broad, expressive relax in speed. That careful, expanding slow-down is exactly what "gradually slower" describes. The other terms point to different ideas: sforzando is a sudden, strong accent; simile means "continue in the same way" (often in articulation or tempo); ritardando or ritenuto involve slowing, but ritardando is more about slowing down toward a new tempo and ritenuto is holding back or delaying rather than easing into a slower pace.

Two different keys sounding at once is called bitonality. In bitonality, one part or voice may outline one key center while another part clearly implies a different key, creating a layered, two-key texture rather than a single tonal center. This matches the idea described in the question, where two keys are active at the same time. The other terms refer to related but different ideas: a canon is a rule-based imitation of a melody in different voices; cantabile means played in a singing, lyrical style; a coda is a concluding section that brings the piece to a close.

5. Which term describes a dynamic marking where loud is immediately followed by soft?

A dynamic marking where loud is immediately followed by soft is Forte-Piano, written as *fp*. It tells you to strike the note or chord with a strong, loud attack and then drop to a soft level right away, creating a quick, dramatic contrast within a short span. This is different from a plain forte, which stays loud, and from fine (end) or fermata (hold). The exact feel of *fp* is that sudden drop from loud to soft, rather than a sustained loudness.

In music shorthand, Italian terms describe how much or how little to alter the music. The word that means less is *meno*, used in markings like *meno mosso* to indicate less motion or tempo. It contrasts with *molto* (very or much), *moderato* (moderate), and *marcato* (emphasized). So *meno* is the indication for doing something to a lesser degree.

Sostenuto is the term that means sustained. It comes from Italian and literally conveys the idea of lasting or continuing sound. In performance, it signals holding certain notes longer than their written value, often by using the sostenuto pedal to keep those notes resonating while others continue. This is different from tenuto, which asks for notes to be held for their full value (or given a slight emphasis) without implying selective long sustain. A slur marks smooth, connected phrasing across notes, not necessarily extra sustain. Subito means suddenly, as in dynamics or tempo, and isn't about sustaining notes.

In piano notation, hand designations tell you which hand should play a note or passage. Mano Sinistra means the left hand; it's literally Italian for "left hand." When you see it, the composer wants the left hand to take those notes, even if they're written on a staff or range you wouldn't normally associate with the left hand. The opposite term, Mano Destra, directs the right hand. Legato and Staccato, on the other hand, refer to how notes are connected or spaced in time rather than which hand plays them. Legato indicates smooth, connected notes, while Staccato indicates short, detached notes. Sometimes you'll see abbreviations like M.S. (mano sinistra) and M.D. (mano destra) in scores, which reinforces that these marks are about hand assignment rather than articulation.

9. Handel is associated with which musical period?

Handel is associated with the Baroque period. He was active in the early to mid-1700s, composing with the ornate melodies, elaborate textures, and continuo bass that characterize Baroque music. Works like Messiah and his operas and oratorios exemplify the grandeur and intricate musical language of that era. The Classical period that follows emphasizes lighter textures and balanced forms, the Romantic era expands expressive content and imagination, and Contemporary music moves into modern techniques. So the Baroque setting is the best fit for Handel.

10. Which term means 'Much, very'?

- A. Moderato
- B. Marcato
- C. Molto**
- D. Meno

Molto is an intensifier in Italian musical terms, meaning "very" or "much." It's used to strengthen the accompanying word in tempo or dynamic markings, like molto allegro (very fast) or molto piano (very soft). The other terms have different meanings: Moderato signals a moderate tempo, Marcato indicates a strong, accented attack, and Meno means less. So when the question asks for the term that means "much, very," molto is the clear fit.
