The emphasis on infection control involved using enhanced PPE to minimize exposure risk, especially during procedures that generated aerosols, a key concern during the pandemic. This included not only the wearing of masks, gowns, and face shields but also the implementation of rigorous sterilization practices in operating rooms and recovery areas. While patient intake was indeed affected by the pandemic, it was the direct change in protocols regarding infection control that represented a significant shift in anesthesia practice. The introduction of telemedicine options, while beneficial, did not replace traditional consultations entirely, and reliance on general anesthesia varied based on specific clinical needs rather than an increase across the board. Therefore, the most significant effect observed was the heightened focus on infection control measures and the necessary adjustments in practice to ensure the safety of all involved.
