Worship is not limited to traditional, silent rituals or merely an intellectual endeavor; it transcends occasional acts performed during service times, aiming for a continual and deepening relationship with God.

These components collectively articulate the church's mission in nurturing spiritual health, warmly engaging the community, and actively fulfilling the Great Commission. The other choices, while containing some relevant terms, do not correctly capture the most recognized and widely accepted elements in the Fourfold Mission framework as defined within many Assemblies of God teachings.
