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Explanations

High construction costs, on the other hand, add to the total project cost and risk, often eroding returns even if other factors are favorable. They can negate the benefits of demand, incentives, or zoning by stretching the financials and lengthening the time to profitability. So, high construction costs do not make adaptive reuse financially viable; they impede viability.

Other approaches fail to promote that connection: updating budgets only occasionally or not at all ignores changing priorities; basing allocations on historical spending locks in past patterns instead of steering resources toward new objectives; and letting a single executive decide without input undermines collaboration, buy-in, and the governance needed to align spending with strategy.

The three essential data sources that fit naturally together are labor market data, utility consumption data, and operational performance metrics. Labor market data shows the size, skills, and availability of the workforce, as well as wage trends and unemployment. This helps you assess whether there is enough talent with the right skills to support existing firms and potential new ones, and what training or workforce pipelines might be needed. Utility consumption data provides a practical read on the scale and energy intensity of local business activity. By looking at electricity, gas, or water usage, you can infer which sectors are active, how large firms are, and where energy infrastructure may need support to accommodate growth. Operational performance metrics capture the real performance of firms—sales, output, productivity, capacity utilization, and margins. This data shows how firms are actually performing, where bottlenecks exist, and where expansion opportunities may lie, making it a direct indicator of competitiveness and growth potential. Together, these sources give a coherent picture of workforce readiness, business scale, and actual performance, which is exactly what BRE diagnostics aim to uncover. The other options pull in factors that don't directly illuminate firm health and expansion potential in the same integrated way.

Aggregation preserves the ability to analyze trends and outcomes while protecting privacy. Limiting access to sensitive information is another essential practice. Implementing role-based access controls ensures that only authorized staff can view confidential data, reducing the chance of leaks or improper use. Training staff on data privacy protocols reinforces these safeguards by making sure everyone knows how to collect, store, transmit, and dispose of data properly, and understands the consequences of mishandling information. So, the option about publicly sharing raw datasets is not recommended because it conflicts with the fundamental goal of confidentiality and can expose sensitive information.

Labor market tightness gauges talent availability, which matters, but it doesn't capture how well firms can operate together through suppliers and related services. Utility consumption levels reflect overall demand or activity but don't specifically show how strong the supplier and support network is. Climate suitability is about location fit, not the strength of the existing regional business ecosystem.
