Under standard guidelines, a pharmacy technician is expected to support safe medication use by performing dispensing-related tasks accurately, applying ethical standards, and being prepared to function in health-system settings. Good documentation also supports quality improvement and accountability within the team. Records should be objective, timely, legible, and signed; personal opinions should not be included. Failing to document all aspects, or documenting only successes or minimal information, compromises safety and accountability.

Reducing wait times can improve the service experience, but it doesn't define the primary goal of patient-centered care. Maximizing profits shifts focus toward financial gain rather than the patient's welfare. Adherence to formulary involves guidelines and cost control, which are important aspects of the system, but they're not the core objective of patient-centered care themselves; patient needs may require options within or outside a formulary with appropriate clinical justification and discussion.
