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Explanations

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1. Which statement best describes Differential Reinforcement?

- A. A type of VSR where we reward the best examples of the behavior and ignore other offers.

Differential Reinforcement means reinforcing only the target behavior and withholding reinforcement for other responses. You reinforce the dog when it performs the desired behavior (or a higher-quality version of it) and ignore or withhold reinforcement for other behaviors, which helps shape the preferred response over time. The described statement fits this idea because it emphasizes rewarding the best examples of the behavior while ignoring other offers. This approach contrasts with rewarding every correct response (continuous reinforcement), punishment-based methods, or reinforcement schedules that reward at fixed times regardless of behavior.

This means the dog becomes more willing to be near and interact with people as it matures. This pattern does not imply that every dog will accept every person instantly or universally. It also isn't accurate to say tameness is solely about conditioning, though experiences and training influence how quickly a dog shows reduced flight distance and greater tolerance. Punishment has no place in this technique, and avoiding object interaction would contradict the purpose of targeting.

A dog might sit because it's hungry for a treat or because the cue was just given and the moment feels right, but that doesn't automatically mean the dog has truly learned to sit in all contexts or without prompting. To determine learning, you'd look for consistent, generalized changes across different environments, times, and distractions, not just a single appearance of the behavior. Memory and reasoning describe other cognitive processes—recalling information and solving problems—not the immediate display of a behavior. So the term that best fits "the doing of a behavior that does not necessarily indicate learning" is performance.

It happens without training and is a natural predisposition across many animals. Obeying a hand signal, socializing with other dogs, and coming when called all rely on learning and reinforcement. They require exposure, practice, and guidance to form the appropriate associations or behaviors, whereas fear of fire is pre-programmed and triggered by the stimulus itself.

For example, a puppy may initially respond to new stimuli with cautious exploration, then learn from training and social exposure to respond more confidently as it matures. In contrast, behaviors that are present at birth and never change are considered innate, not ontogenetic; purely instinctive behaviors imply no learning or life-long development; and stating they're only learned in adolescence ignores that development and learning can occur at many life stages.
