Without an adequate energy supply, animals would be unable to perform essential functions vital to their survival. This rule applies specifically to 4, differentiating it from the criteria used for other numbers. For instance, the rule regarding being divisible by 2 involves only the last digit, and while an even total for the digits suggests divisibility by 2, it does not apply for divisibility by 4. Each of the alternative options reflects less specific criteria related to number 4, making the understanding of these rules essential for accurately determining divisibility.
