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Explanations

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1. Which option matches a 90-degree clockwise rotation?

Think of rotation in terms of turning to the right. A 90-degree turn clockwise is exactly a quarter-turn to the right, described as ninety degrees clockwise. That description matches the requested rotation. The other options describe different amounts or directions: ninety degrees counterclockwise is the opposite turn; a half-turn is 180 degrees; and three-quarters of a turn (270 degrees clockwise) ends up as a ninety-degree counterclockwise rotation, not a clockwise one.

Light and shadow define form by showing the volume and depth of an object on a flat surface. The way light wraps across surfaces creates highlights, midtones, and shadows that reveal curves, edges, and planes, making a shape read as three-dimensional. Color indicates hue, texture describes surface feel, and size relates to scale, but none of these alone establish the solid, volumetric presence that light and shadow deliver. By adjusting how light falls and where shadows fall, you communicate the form—the roundedness, flat planes, and overall mass of the object.

Understanding typography adjustments is about using the Character panel. This panel is where you control all the font-related attributes: font family and style, font size, leading (line height), tracking (overall letter spacing), kerning (spacing between specific character pairs), vertical scale, and baseline shift. These options let you shape how your text sits and reads within your design, independently of any image edits. The other panels serve different purposes. The Brushes Panel controls brush dynamics for painting. The Adjustments Panel contains tonal and color corrections like Levels, Curves, and Hue/Saturation. The Effects Panel applies layer styles such as shadows and glows. None of these affect font choice or typography in the way the Character panel does, so for adjusting typeface and typography attributes, the Character panel is the appropriate tool.

Masking is the technique that lets you hide or reveal parts of a layer without changing the underlying pixels. A layer mask is like a stencil attached to the layer: painting with black hides the corresponding areas, painting with white reveals them, and grays give partial transparency. Because you're not erasing anything, you can always adjust, disable, or delete the mask to restore the full layer at any time. Masks can be created from selections, gradients, or brush strokes, and you can refine edges with feathering or soft brushes to blend seamlessly. This non-destructive approach is ideal for compositing or removing unwanted areas while keeping the original image intact.

Paths are the building blocks of vector images. A vector graphic describes shapes with mathematical paths—lines and curves defined by anchor points and handles—so the artwork can be scaled up or down without losing sharpness. Tools like the Pen or Shape tools create and edit these paths, letting you fill or stroke the shapes precisely. Pixels, by contrast, are the tiny squares that makeup raster images, which can become jagged or blurred when enlarged. Layers are just a way to organize content, not the mechanism that creates vector geometry, and filters are effects applied to existing content rather than the method used to define scalable shapes.

A clipping mask uses the shape and transparency of a layer above to control the visibility of all layers beneath it. Only the parts of the lower layers that fall inside the opaque areas of the masking layer are shown; areas outside the shape stay hidden. This makes clipping masks great for applying textures, patterns, or gradients to a specific silhouette—like text or a logo—without painting on each layer individually. It's different from a layer mask, which affects only its own layer by painting grayscale transparency. It's also different from a vector mask, which uses vector shapes for crisp, scalable edges, and from an alpha channel, which stores transparency information as a separate channel for the whole image. In a clipping mask setup, multiple layers beneath the masking layer share the same visible boundary, all constrained by that one shape.

Opacity controls determine transparency for a layer or group. In Photoshop, you can set opacity anywhere from 0% to 100%. A value of 0% makes the layer completely transparent, while 100% makes it fully opaque. You can adjust this using the Opacity slider or by typing a value in the Layers panel. Since any percentage within that full range is valid, the statement is correct. It's not limited to 50%, and the opacity can be changed, so options suggesting otherwise don't fit.

Clipping masks use the shape of the upper layer to determine visibility of the layers beneath. The top layer acts like a stencil: its opaque areas reveal whatever is on the layers below, while its transparent areas hide those parts. This lets you carve out irregular shapes from underlying content simply by shaping the upper layer. This differs from a layer mask, which controls transparency on its own layer using grayscale values you paint on the mask. A vector mask uses vector shapes to define transparency, typically affecting a single layer or a group based on scalable vector outlines. An alpha channel stores overall transparency information for the image as a separate channel rather than being driven by the content of a visible shape.

The primary working area in Photoshop is the canvas. The canvas is the actual drawing surface where your image exists as pixels and where all edits take place. It represents the visible portion of your document—the space you paint, transform, and manipulate. The document is the Photoshop file that stores the canvas along with all layers and settings; the workspace refers to how you arrange tools and panels around that area; a panel is a specific UI window like Layers or Adjustments. So, when you think of the place you edit the image itself, that's the canvas.

Filling a contiguous region with color quickly relies on a tool that paints all connected pixels that are similar in color with a single click. The Paint Bucket Tool does exactly that: set your foreground color, click inside a region that is connected and shares similar color values, and the entire area fills with that color. You can adjust the tolerance to include more or fewer nearby colors, which helps when edges aren't perfectly uniform. This makes it ideal for solid-color shapes or areas that are one consistent hue. If you need a gradient or you have noncontinuous areas, other tools are better suited. The Lasso Tool is for drawing or selecting freehand shapes, the Quick Selection Tool helps you pick areas by edges to edit, and the Gradient Tool creates a color transition rather than a solid fill.
