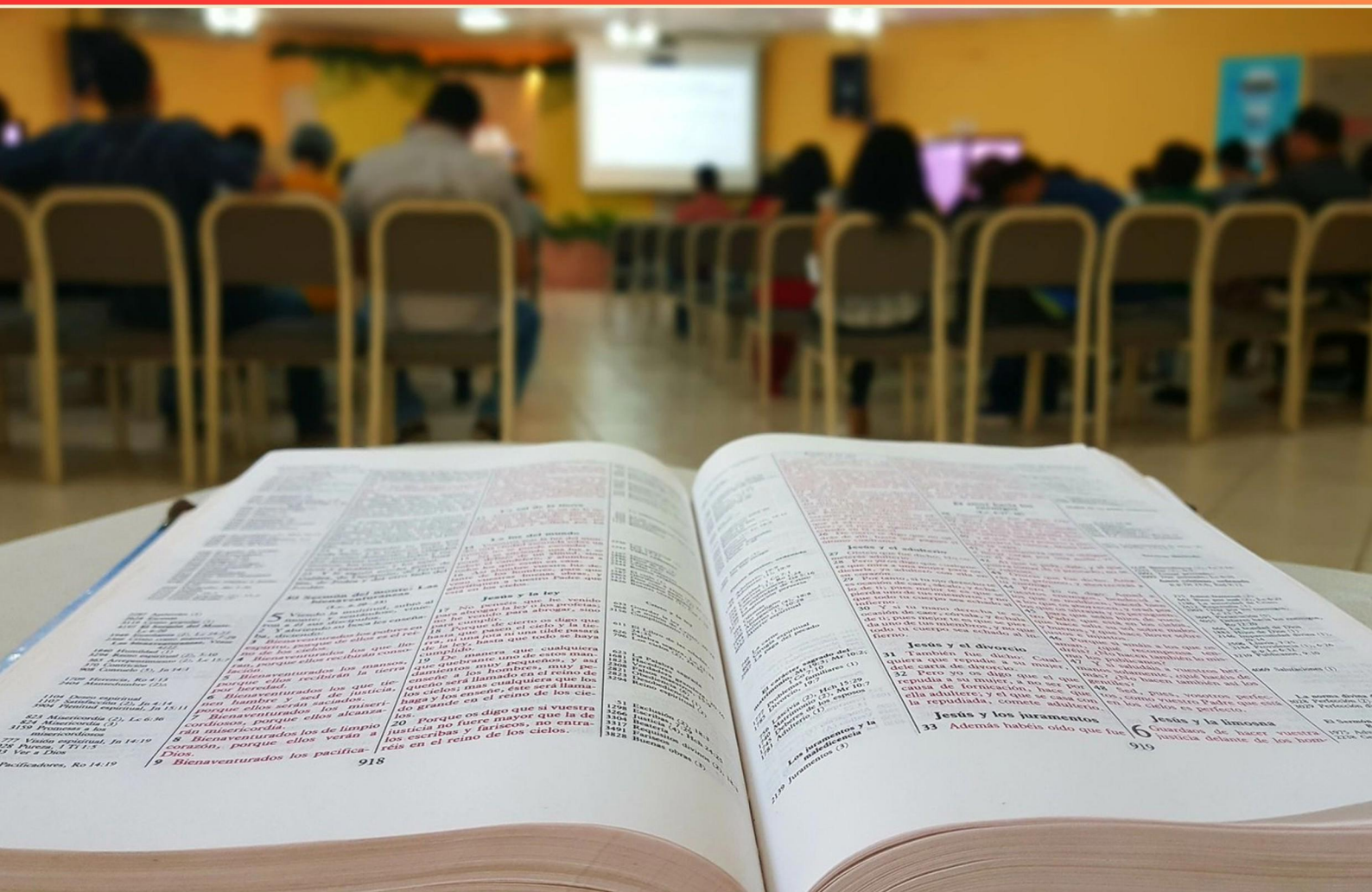

The statement on suffering, although relevant to the broader narrative of Christian hope, is not the central focus in this specific chapter.
