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Explanations

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1. What is a key purpose of accountability within charity governance codes?

Accountability in charity governance codes means the board is transparent and answerable to stakeholders, including donors, beneficiaries, regulators, and the public. It's about showing how decisions are made, how funds are used, and how performance is monitored, with clear reporting and independent oversight to justify actions and hold the organisation to account. This openness helps build trust and demonstrates that resources are used effectively to pursue the charity's mission. External audits and regular reporting are part of the mechanisms that support accountability, not something to be avoided, and responsibility isn't placed solely on staff—the board has a governance role in ensuring proper stewardship.

Ban the Box focuses on giving people with criminal records a fair chance by removing automatic barriers in the early hiring steps, so they can be considered first for their skills and qualifications. The idea is to judge candidates on what they can do for the job rather than condemning them for past mistakes at the outset. It isn't about permanently banning someone from employment, forcing employment, or eliminating background checks entirely; rather, it emphasizes not disqualifying someone before they've had a chance to demonstrate their abilities, with checks often occurring later if appropriate.

Think about how donors shape what money is used for. Restricted funds are tied to specific purposes or programs by the donor, and they must be tracked separately in the charity's accounts to ensure those exact restrictions are honored. The restriction stays in place until the donor's conditions are met or the restriction expires, at which point any remaining amount can be used more flexibly. Unrestricted funds have no such donor-imposed limits, so they can be applied to general needs—whether program costs, administration, or other operations—within the charity's governance rules. That's why the best description is that restricted funds must be used for specified purposes and tracked separately, while unrestricted funds can be used more flexibly. The idea that unrestricted funds require donor consent for use isn't correct, because unrestricted gifts aren't bound by donor-imposed limits. Conversely, saying restricted funds can be used for any purpose contradicts what "restricted" means. And there isn't a universal rule that both types must be spent within one year; restrictions can be multi-year or even permanent, depending on donor terms.

Charities are ordinarily funded from a mix of donations, legacies (money left in wills), grants, and income generated from their own activities. Gift Aid is a tax relief that lets charities reclaim basic-rate tax on eligible donations from HM Revenue & Customs. When a donor who pays basic rate tax makes a Gift Aid declaration, the charity can reclaim 25p of tax for every £1 donated, so a £100 donation becomes worth £125 to the charity. Higher-rate taxpayers can claim additional relief on their tax return, but the charity's uplift comes from the basic-rate reclaim. Gift Aid isn't a government grant, a penalty, or a loan, and it doesn't replace the broader funding that charities rely on.

Charities and pressure groups engage with a wide range of people affected by crime, not just those who commit minor offenses. They run rehabilitation programs and supportive services inside prisons and in the community, work with people on probation or parole, and facilitate restorative justice initiatives that can involve serious offenders. They also support families and victims and push for policy changes that impact offenders at all levels. Because their activities span from minor to serious offenses and include advocacy as well as direct support, the statement is false.

At the heart of this is ensuring that justice is fair and humane by grounding it in rights and equality. Human rights establish the minimum standards every person is owed in the justice process—things like a fair hearing, due process, protection from torture or cruel treatment, and access to legal aid. Equality means everyone should be treated the same under the law, with no discrimination based on background, identity, or circumstances, so marginalized groups aren't denied justice. When charities advocate for these principles, they push for reforms, oversight, and services that uphold dignity and fairness in policing, detention, trials, and rehabilitation. Other options miss the mark because they focus on aims like punishment or deterrence, or on how the system is run (privatization and efficiency, or speed and flexibility) rather than on guaranteeing fair treatment and rights. While those concerns can matter, they don't inherently ensure that the justice system remains fair and humane in the way rights-based and equality-focused advocacy does.

The Prison Reform Trust brings expertise in challenging unjust detention and advocating for policy changes in the criminal justice system, while the Women's Institute provides broad reach, a strong focus on women's welfare, and a large grassroots network. Their collaboration makes sense for a campaign aimed at reducing custody for vulnerable people, particularly women, and pushing for care-based alternatives. The other pairings don't fit the campaign's typical coalition: they mix organizations with different primary focuses or audiences (global human rights advocacy, medical associations, or science societies) rather than a criminal-justice reform group working with a nationwide women's organization.

The Charity Commission's job is to regulate and register charities in England and Wales to protect public trust. It also has powers to investigate and take action if a charity or its trustees mismanage resources. This role isn't about accrediting fundraisers, setting local council budgets, or licensing charitable hospitals, which are handled by other bodies or government functions. So the described combination—registering charities, supervising governance, enforcing charity law, and maintaining the public register—best fits the Charity Commission.

Philosophy guides the organisation by embedding its beliefs and values into the way it intends to operate. When philosophy drives aims, the goals express the organisation's purpose and ethical framework, ensuring consistency across strategy, activities, and decisions. Therefore, philosophy represents the underlying beliefs and values driving the organisation's goals. If philosophy were unrelated to aims, there'd be no coherence; if aims determined philosophy completely, philosophy would be hollow and purely reactive; if philosophy only affected branding, its influence would be limited to appearance rather than meaning and direction.

Public benefit applies to every part of a charity's work, including advocacy. Advocacy is allowed as part of charitable activity, but it must serve the public good and advance the charity's purposes, not private interests. The best way to describe this is that public benefit is central to advocacy: the actions should promote charitable aims and bring benefits to the public, rather than benefiting individuals or founders privately. If advocacy were to prioritize private gain or ignore its impact on the public, it would fail the public benefit test.
