The question hinges on who had direct, firsthand contact with Booth and could identify him to others afterward. Dr. Mudd treated Booth after the assassination and knew exactly who Booth was. That close, real-world connection is why he could tell Samuel Cox Jr. that the man who had appeared as the stranger was Booth all along. Lincoln was gone and couldn't speak, Stanton was involved in the broader investigation, and Cox Jr. wouldn't have had that knowledge without someone who had actually seen Booth. So the person best positioned to reveal Booth's true identity to the boy is Dr. Mudd.

**2. Why did officials want to move Lincoln from Ford's Theatre?**

Ford's Theatre is a memorial to Abraham Lincoln because the president was assassinated there, tying the site directly to his life and the nation's grieving period after his death. On the night of April 14, 1865, Lincoln attended a performance and was shot by John Wilkes Booth; he died the following morning at the nearby Petersen House. That event and its aftermath are what the site preserves and commemorates—today the theatre operates as a museum and historic site dedicated to Lincoln, his presidency, and the impact of his leadership during a pivotal moment in American history. It is not a memorial for Booth or other individuals connected to the event.

This detail directly shows the strain and danger of their pursuit and explains why their appearance wouldn't help them stay unnoticed. The other options don't fit the scene as described—they didn't have formal attire to look suspicious, they weren't wearing obvious disguises, and there's no emphasis on bright colors in their flight.

Reconstruction is the major shift being tested. With the Civil War ending in 1865, the nation faced how to reunite the Union and redefine the status and rights of newly freed African Americans. Reconstruction aimed to readmit Southern states into the Union, rebuild the South's economy and governments, and secure civil and political rights for freedpeople, including the push toward constitutional amendments. Lincoln's assassination that year meant his vision for a quicker, more conciliatory rebuilding process influenced the early policy direction, but the period of Reconstruction—roughly 1865 through the late 1870s—became the defining national project that followed his death. The other options don't fit the timing or focus. The Progressive Era comes later and centers on reforms in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The Louisiana Purchase occurred in 1803, long before Lincoln's time. The Industrial Revolution describes broader, ongoing industrial and economic change that began earlier and is not anchored to Lincoln's death.

**6. Why was the press not informed about Booth's final resting place? (alternative phrasing)**

The main idea being tested is how authorities tried to control the public narrative after a shocking event. Keeping Booth's burial location secret was a deliberate move to prevent the burial from becoming a sensational, headline-grabbing chase by the press.

Journalists at the time often framed dramatic stories in striking, attention-getting ways, and revealing the resting place could turn the burial into a spectacle rather than a straightforward report. By withholding the exact site, officials aimed to throw the press off track and minimize sensational coverage, focusing attention on the investigation rather than a sensational burial tale. The other options don't fit as well. There wasn't a known request from the press for privacy, so it wasn't about honoring their wishes. It wasn't about preventing public panic, since the burial wasn't something that would incite widespread fear. And there wasn't a formal classification of Booth's burial site; keeping it secret wasn't about a classified location.

Understanding Booth's route inside Ford's Theatre centers on the building's layout: the path to the vestibule required climbing a curved staircase. The theatre's back area connected the stage to the vestibule via a curved flight, not a straight set of steps or any elevator. This curved staircase fit the architecture and gave Booth the ascent he needed to move toward the vestibule as part of his escape route. A straight flight wouldn't match the described passage, and an elevator wouldn't have existed in that era or setting. A rope climb would be out of place for this scenario, making the curved staircase the correct feature.

Mary Lincoln's intense emotional upset centers on the death of her son Willie, who died at age eleven during the White House years. The narrative emphasizes her deep grief—she weeps, withdraws, and remains distressed for a long time after his death—showing how profoundly losing a child affected her during the presidency. The other family members listed either did not die in the story or their deaths did not produce the same described emotional impact (Edward died earlier in childhood, and Robert and Tad are portrayed as surviving). Willie's death is the event that the text highlights as causing the most noticeable emotional response in Mary.

It wasn't about Booth's words or past behavior; it was the immediate cue of those riders and Booth's instinctive fear in the moment that underscored the imminent risk of being discovered.

Ford's Theatre is located in Washington, D.C.
