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Explanations

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1. The material implies that sources can do what to interpretation?

The main idea is that sources influence how we understand events. Sources aren't neutral; they carry the creator's perspective, choices, and limitations. This means they can guide what readers notice, emphasize certain details, and leave others out, which can shape or even distort our interpretation. For example, a newspaper from the time might highlight different aspects than a personal diary, and language or framing can steer how readers view the events. That's why the best answer says sources shape or distort interpretation. The other options assume sources always preserve meaning exactly, remove bias completely, or have no influence, none of which aligns with how sources actually work in shaping understanding.

2. What was the purpose of Booth delivering a package to Mary Surratt?

Booth needed a discreet way to move weapons and supplies for the conspiracy, and Mary Surratt's boardinghouse provided a trusted contact point along the escape network. Delivering a package to her was part of arming the conspirators and stockpiling gear that would be used in the plan and during the escape. This shows why the action makes sense in the story: the plot relied on passing arms through reliable, connected civilians rather than handling money, a confession, or a message to Lincoln.

3. Which object did Booth deliberately keep in his hand during the escape?

The scenario tests your recall of Booth's actions in the moments after the assassination and what he chose to hold onto as he fled. Keeping a knife in his hand during the escape shows Booth choosing a small, readily accessible weapon for close, immediate use in a chaotic chase. In a rushed escape through crowds and potential pursuit, a concealed or quickly drawn blade could be advantageous for defending himself or cutting through obstacles if needed, without drawing the kind of attention a larger weapon might. This detail highlights Booth's readiness to stay in control of the situation even as he was trying to disappear. A pistol would have been obvious and tied directly to the act of shooting Lincoln, which would complicate the escape narrative or draw unnecessary scrutiny. A badge wouldn't fit a conspirator trying to blend in, and a letter wouldn't serve a practical purpose in the moment of fleeing. The knife stands out as the item Booth deliberately kept in hand to maintain readiness in a dangerous, fast-moving escape.

He believed it was improper for the killer of Abraham Lincoln to be protected on his land, and that cooperating with authorities was the just thing to do for public safety and justice. This moral stance overrides any concern about personal risk or rewards, which is why that motive best explains his action. The other ideas—seeking a quick capture for a reward or fearing for his own safety—aren't what the account emphasizes; the emphasis is on his belief that Booth's presence on the property should be ending, not continued.

5. If a president were assassinated today, what punishment would be described as most humane according to the material?

The main idea this question tests is how the material defines a humane response to a grave crime within a legal framework. In that context, being punished through the formal system—subject to due process, consideration of rights, and the structured path toward justice—is considered the most humane option. Why death row fits that idea: it represents punishment carried out under a legal process. The offender would be tried in court, receive counsel, have rights protected, and go through appeals. While the outcome is severe, the path to that outcome follows the rule of law rather than vigilante or extrajudicial measures. The other options don't align with this approach: fines and community service are inappropriate for murder; exile removes the person from the country but bypasses the domestic legal process and can raise other humanitarian and practical concerns; life imprisonment, though severe and humane in many respects, does not reflect the same formal culmination within the legal system that the material associates with the concept of a humane, orderly response.

Capturing the Confederate capital shifted the war's momentum and lifted morale in the Union capital. Richmond had been the political heart and a symbolic center of the Confederacy; its fall meant the Confederate government and many of its forces had lost their stronghold, signaling that the South's resistance was crumbling. News of this victory in Washington excited people because it suggested the end of the war was in sight, even though the fighting would continue for a few days more (the final surrender would come a bit later at Appomattox). The other events aren't tied to that date: the surrender at Appomattox happened later, the Mississippi crossing occurred earlier, and Philadelphia never fell to Union forces.

7. Which weapon did Powell use to injure Seward's cheek?

Powell attacked Seward with a knife. He entered Seward's home when Seward, who was recovering from a carriage accident, was bedridden and used a large blade to slash Seward's cheek, leaving a deep wound. This aligns with historical accounts that emphasize a blade—not a gun or a long sword—in this assault. A pistol wouldn't fit the description of Seward's injury in this event, and a switchblade isn't what the records describe Powell using. So the weapon that did the injury was a knife.

8. How are Booth's motives described in relation to his Confederate sympathies?

- A. He sought to revive the Confederacy and undermine Union leadership**
- B. He hoped to secure a pardon for Confederate leaders

Booth acted from deep Confederate sympathies, believing the South could be revived only if Lincoln and the Union leadership were removed. He framed his act as a political strike against the federal government and its emancipation policies, aiming to shake the Union enough to empower a Confederate resurgence. That is why his motive is described as seeking to revive the Confederacy and undermine Union leadership. The other ideas don't fit because his actions were not about personal grievance alone, nor about seeking pardons for Confederate leaders, and they weren't intended as a retreat to a neutral country—his plan was to strike in Washington to influence the outcome of the national conflict.

During a hurried escape, what matters most is whether you can blend in and avoid drawing attention. Booth and Herold were on the run after the assassination, traveling quickly and living rough along the route. Their clothes had become dirty, and they didn't have a change of clothes to freshen up or switch into, which made them look worn and suspicious. This detail directly shows the strain and danger of their pursuit and explains why their appearance wouldn't help them stay unnoticed. The other options don't fit the scene as described—they didn't have formal attire to look suspicious, they weren't wearing obvious disguises, and there's no emphasis on bright colors in their flight.

10. Which statement about Booth's objectives is NOT accurate?

- A. He wanted to revive the Confederacy and puncture Union leadership

The main idea is Booth's motives and approach. He believed violence would strike a blow to the Union and help the Confederate cause, not diplomacy. So saying he sought a peaceful settlement with the Union isn't accurate—the plan was to kill Lincoln and disrupt Union leadership to influence the war's outcome, not to negotiate a settlement. This fits with his aim to revive the Confederacy by puncturing the Union's leadership and his actions were driven by Confederate sympathy, reflecting a mindset that favored decisive, forceful action over negotiation.
