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Explanations

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1. When was RA 9297 approved by President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo?

- A. February 6, 2004
- B. February 22, 2004

The important idea is that a Republic Act is considered approved on the date the President signs it into law. For RA 9297, the signing occurred on May 13, 2004, by President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo. That signing date is the official date of approval. The other dates listed are different milestones (earlier stages like passage by the legislature or later steps like publication and possible effectivity), but they do not represent the date the law was approved. After signing, the law is published in the Official Gazette and specifies when it takes effect, which is typically a set period after publication unless otherwise stated.

2. Which pairing of institutions is cited for copyright registration and deposition?

Copyright processes often split into two parallel tasks: preserving copies of a work and officially recognizing the work for protection. Depositing copies with a national library creates a public, long-term record of published works, ensuring accessibility and preservation for future generations. Official registration, on the other hand, provides a formal acknowledgement of authorship and legal protection, which in this jurisdiction is handled by the Supreme Court rather than a separate IP office. This pairing—National Library for deposition and Supreme Court for registration—reflects the statutory arrangement that assigns the storage of copies to the national library while giving the Supreme Court the authority to grant legal recognition of the work. In other systems, registration might be centralized in an IP office, or deposition could be with a different archive, but the described setup aligns with how this context structures copyright duties.

3. To whom does the Board of Chemical Engineering or its authorized representative coordinate in the inspection of facilities, faculty, equipment and other aspects directly related to the Chemical Engineering program of educational institutions?

In the Philippines, higher education program quality and standards are overseen by CHED, so the Board of Chemical Engineering (as part of the licensing boards) coordinates with CHED when inspecting facilities, faculty, equipment, and other program-related aspects at educational institutions. CHED leads the quality assurance process for engineering programs and works with the Board to verify that the program meets national standards. The other options do not play this coordinating role in program inspections: PRC handles licensure and professional regulation, while DOST and PICHE are not the bodies responsible for coordinating these program inspections.

4. Which Officer Is Capable Of Granting Compulsory Licensing Permission?

Compulsory licensing is a government-authorized permission to use a patented invention without the owner's consent, allowed under specific public-interest conditions. In the Indian IP framework, the power to grant such a license sits with the Director-General of the Intellectual Property Office, who heads the Patent Office and acts as the licensing authority for patent matters. This makes the Director-General the correct official to issue the compulsory license. The other roles listed handle related administrative tasks—legal affairs, technology transfer, or patent administration—but they do not possess the statutory authority to grant compulsory licenses. Their roles support the process, while the final licensing decision rests with the Director-General.

5. A chemical engineer shall not use equipment, supplies, laboratory, or office facilities of an employer to carry on outside private practice.

The main idea here is about boundaries in using employer resources. Equipment, supplies, laboratory space, and office facilities are owned by the employer and are provided to perform the employer's work. Using those same resources to run outside private practice diverts assets and time from the company's needs, which can amount to misappropriation of resources, create conflicts of interest, and raise confidentiality or intellectual property concerns. Because of these fundamental reasons, the stance is that you should not use employer resources for outside private practice, even if you think you could avoid interfering with your duties. Consent from the employer does not automatically make this permissible, and many policies would still prohibit such use. This is why the statement is considered absolutely true.

6. Which country did not agree to sign the Kyoto Protocol and, as of 2005, was the largest emitter per capita of gases believed to cause global warming?

The idea here is to connect two ideas: what a country signs in an international treaty, and how much each person in that country contributes to greenhouse gas emissions. The Kyoto Protocol created binding targets for developed nations, but signing and ratifying are not the same thing, and not every major emitter joined in a way that bound them to targets by 2005. Per-capita emissions look at the average footprint of each person in a country, and those numbers tend to be highest in places with energy-intensive economies and heavy coal use. Among the options, the country that stands out as having a very high per-capita emissions level in that period is Australia, driven by its energy mix and consumption patterns. This helps explain why it's the choice associated with the two parts of the question: relatively high per-capita emissions and a stance that did not align with Kyoto participation as of 2005. The other countries either had lower per-capita footprints or different levels of involvement with Kyoto by that time.

7. When submitting industrial plant plans for approval, whose seal must be stamped on all pages?

The key idea is that plans submitted for approval must carry the engineer's professional seal on every page. That seal shows the drawings were prepared under a licensed professional engineer who takes responsibility for their accuracy and compliance with applicable codes. It provides a clear link to the individual engineer who can be held accountable, which is essential for regulatory review and safety standards. Without that seal, there is no verified professional ownership of the design. Other seals don't serve this purpose: a board's official seal is not typically stamped on engineering drawings themselves; a PRC seal is for licensure verification, not for certifying the technical content of each page; and a CHED seal relates to education credentials, not the engineering plans.

8. What is the Republic Act number of the new Chemical Engineering Law?

Republic Acts are identified by a unique number that serves as the official citation for the law. The new Chemical Engineering Law is assigned a specific RA number that you would use when referencing or locating the text in legal sources. In this case, the official citation is 9297, the number that uniquely identifies that act. The other numbers belong to different statutes and would not designate the Chemical Engineering Law. If you ever want to verify, you can check the Official Gazette or the Congress website for the exact RA citation of the act.

9. In patent law, which body is typically responsible for granting patents within a country?

Patents are typically granted by the country's national patent office, a government agency that examines applications for novelty and inventive step and issues patents enforceable within that country. This office also maintains the official patent register, handles publication, and oversees maintenance of granted patents. In some regions, a regional office (such as the European Patent Office) can grant patents that may cover multiple countries, but those patents still rely on national procedures for final protection in each member country. The Patent Cooperation Treaty provides a unified filing route to pursue protection in multiple jurisdictions but does not itself grant patents. So, the body most responsible for granting patents within a country is the national patent office.

10. Which act amended some portions of RA 5186?

- A. RA 1655
- B. RA 166

When a law is amended, a newer statute will explicitly change specific provisions of the older one. To know which act amended RA 5186, look for the statute that contains language stating it "amends" or "modifies" particular sections of RA 5186. The act that does this is the one that actually amended those portions of RA 5186, making it the correct reference. In this set, the act that includes amendments to RA 5186 is RA 5455. The other acts listed do not contain provisions that modify RA 5186, so they don't fit the description of amending it.
