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Explanations

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1. How is hair elasticity evaluated during a strand test?

- A. Gently stretch a strand and observe its ability to return to its original length without excessive elongation or snapping.
- B. Pull the strand hard to test if it breaks instantly.

Elasticity is measured by how well hair returns to its original length after being stretched. In a strand test, you gently stretch a single strand and watch whether it springs back to its normal length without staying elongated or snapping. This approach reveals the hair's ability to recover after bending and stretching, which is what elasticity is all about. It's a safe, practical way to gauge how the hair will respond to chemical treatments or styling that involve stretching or tension. The other methods don't test rebound: pulling hard to see if it breaks focuses on strength and can cause damage; soaking in water looks at swelling and porosity rather than elastic recovery; applying heat observes deformation under heat, which is more about heat resistance than recoil after a small stretch.

Wrap patterns in permanent waving determine how curls form by controlling where the hair overlaps and how the curl pattern develops along the scalp. Croquignole wraps the hair from ends toward the scalp, while spiral wraps the hair lengthwise around the rod. Bricklay wrap is the variation that is commonly associated with these because it staggers the base sections like bricks instead of lining them up in straight rows. This offset arrangement makes the curl pattern more uniform across the head, reduces visible seams or ridges, and helps distribute the waving solution more evenly for a natural-looking result. Other sectioning styles exist, but bricklay is the classic companion to croquignole and spiral in perm/wrap techniques.

Rod size determines the curl diameter you'll get, because it sets how tightly the hair is wrapped around each rod during wrapping. The goal is to achieve the desired curl after the perm solution processes and the hair is neutralized, so you pick a rod size that will produce that pattern. Smaller rods create tighter curls, while larger rods give looser, softer waves. Beyond the desired curl, several hair characteristics guide the choice. Hair length and diameter affect how many wraps you can and should make in a section, and how the curl will appear once formed. Hair texture matters because very coarse or very fine hair responds differently to the chemical processing and how well it holds a curl. Porosity also plays a role: highly porous hair can process faster and may release moisture quickly, which influences how the curl forms and holds; this can push you toward a rod size that achieves the intended pattern without overprocessing. In short, rod size is chosen to match the target curl pattern while accommodating how the hair behaves during processing. Hair color, eye color, or age don't determine rod size.

The main idea here is about products that come ready to use without any mixing. A lye relaxer uses sodium hydroxide as its active ingredient and is sold as a single-component product that you apply directly from the container. This means there's no need to measure or mix it with another component before use. No-lye relaxers, guanidine relaxers, and ammonium-based systems typically involve more complex formulations or steps, such as separate components that must be combined or specific neutralizers after processing. Because they don't come as a single, ready-to-use component, they aren't the one-component type described in the question. So, the term that describes a relaxer containing only one component used without mixing is the lye relaxer.

5. During the neutralization step, which function is performed?

In chemical texture services, the neutralization step serves to stop the waving solution and to set the new curl by reforming the hair's disulfide bonds. After the reducing agent breaks the original disulfide bonds, the neutralizer oxidizes the hair again, rebuilding those bonds in the new configuration so the shape holds. It also deactivates the waving lotion so processing stops. Other options don't fit because removing moisture, changing cortex color, or creating melanin pigments aren't functions of neutralization in a perm.

Choosing perm rod size is about shaping the curl you want. The diameter of each rod sets how tight or loose the curl will be, so the desired curl pattern should guide the overall rod size plan across the head. Hair density influences how many rods you wrap in a given area and how evenly the curl will form; dense hair can require different sectioning to avoid gaps and over-concentration. Hair length and diameter affect wrapping technique and how many sections fit, which also changes the final curl. Porosity affects how deeply the perm solution penetrates and how the curl sets, influencing processing needs and the stability of the result. Since the intended curl pattern drives the rod size choice, that factor is indeed important to consider; treating it as not a factor would miss a critical part of achieving the desired outcome.

Permanent waving works by breaking the hair's disulfide bonds and then re-forming them in a new shape. The reduction step achieves this by adding hydrogen atoms to the sulfur atoms in the bonds, converting disulfide (-S-S-) into two sulfhydryl (-SH) groups. The hydrogen comes from the reducing agent used in perms (such as ammonium thioglycolate), which donates hydrogen to the bonds. Therefore, hydrogen is the chemical responsible for driving the reduction reaction in this process. Oxygen would promote oxidation instead, and nitrogen or carbon dioxide don't participate in this reduction step. After shaping, a neutralizer then re-oxidizes the sulfhydryl groups to re-form disulfide bonds and lock in the new curl.

Wrap patterns in permanent waving determine how the hair is positioned around the rod and how the curl develops. The two patterns most commonly used are croquignole and spiral wraps. In croquignole, the hair is wrapped from the ends toward the scalp in overlapping layers. This tends to produce a curl that is tighter at the scalp and looser toward the ends, giving a classic, defined curl pattern. In spiral wraps, the hair is wound in a spiral along the length of the rod, which typically creates a longer-lasting wave with more uniform curl along the hair's length. A bricklay variation is a way to offset the wraps within the spiral method to reduce gaps and create a more natural look. These two patterns cover the standard approaches used in most permanent-waving services. Patterns described as braiding or twisting, or other non-rod wrap methods, aren't the typical perm wrap techniques, and a single spiral wrap doesn't encompass the broader range of outcomes seen with croquignole and spiral methods.

Strand testing is about predicting how the client's hair will react to the chemical processing. By applying the product to a small, representative strand, you observe how the hair responds over time—how quickly it lifts or loosens, and what processing time is needed to reach the desired result. This directly tells you the appropriate processing time and the strength of the chemical to use for that individual's hair. If the strand over-processes or shows too much lift too quickly, you know to shorten the time or weaken the solution; if it under-processes, you adjust the time or strength accordingly. This helps prevent damage and ensures the final texture matches the goal. The other ideas aren't the primary purpose: determining final color shade is separate, porosity assessment is useful but doesn't specify timing and strength on the hair, and allergy testing is done with a patch test, not a strand test.

For clients with dermatitis, safety hinges on screening for sensitivities, using gentler formulations, and choosing the right timing based on skin health. A patch test before the service helps identify ingredients that could trigger a reaction, so you know what to avoid. Using a base cream and milder formulas reduces exposure to potentially irritating substances and provides a gentler starting point for any product contact during the texture service. If dermatitis is active, postponing the service protects the skin from added irritation and allows inflammation to subside. Combining these steps gives the most protective approach, addressing sensitivity, minimizing irritants, and respecting the skin's current condition. The other options miss one or more of these safeguards, making them less suitable for someone with a dermatitis history.
