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Explanations

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1. Which term means gradually faster?

- A. Ritardando
- B. Accelerando**
- C. Rallentando
- D. Rubato

Gradually faster tempo is shown by **accelerando**, which tells you to steadily increase the speed of the beat as you go. This direction builds forward momentum and energy, lifting the music toward a more brisk pace. **Ritardando** and **rallentando** both indicate slowing down, so they point in the opposite direction. **Rubato** refers to flexible timing for expressive effect rather than a planned change in tempo. So **accelerando** is the term that specifically means gradually faster.

2. What does the repeat sign indicate?

- A. Repeat the end of a section

Repeat signs tell you to replay a portion of the music. They mark where to start repeating and where the repeat ends. When you see a pair of repeat signs, you go back to the matching sign and play the material between them again, possibly looping it one or more times as the composer indicates. This is exactly what it means to repeat from the beginning or to repeat the section between repeat signs. Tempo changes aren't governed by repeat signs, which is why that option doesn't fit. Endings are marked differently as well, and a repeat sign itself doesn't mean you end the piece.

3. Which rest indicates four beats of silence?

In common time, a rest that covers four beats is used to show a full-measure silence. That rest is called a whole rest, and it stands for the entire measure of silence. So four beats of silence fit one whole rest. The other rests represent shorter silences: a two-beat rest, a one-beat rest, and a half-beat rest, respectively. They don't equal four beats, so they aren't the correct choice for four beats of silence.

4. What is the function of the Natural Sign?

The Natural Sign cancels a previous alteration on a note, returning it to its unmodified pitch. It specifically cancels any sharp or flat that was applied earlier in the same measure, or it cancels the note's alteration from the key signature for the rest of that measure. The effect applies only within the measure, and once the bar ends, accidentals reset. For example, if the key signature has F sharp, writing an F with a natural sign makes that F natural in that measure; if an F sharp appeared earlier in the measure, the natural sign on a later F cancels that sharp for the remaining notes in the measure.

In musical markings, a directive that means "with spirit" signals energy and buoyancy in how you perform. The term that fits this sense most directly is the one that literally translates to "with spirit." It cues players and singers to bring a lively, spirited character to the music, with forward motion and bright energy. Dolce means sweetly and gently, which is the opposite of lively. Expressivo asks for expressive shading in general, not specifically a spirited character. Con anima means with soul or feeling, which emphasizes heartfelt emotion rather than brisk energy. So con spirito is the best fit for a lively, spirited interpretation.

Smooth and connected describes legato. Legato is the term for playing notes in one flowing line, with little or no separation between them so the sound feels continuous. In notation, you aim to connect the notes into a single, sustained phrase—through breath or bow, or by guiding the phrase with fingers and using pedal on piano to keep the line smooth. This contrasts with staccato (short and detached), marcato (boldly accented and separated), and tenuto (held for full value with slight emphasis).

7. Which term means "majestic, dignified"?

Maestoso signals a stately, dignified, majestic character in music. It tells performers to play with grandeur and a measured, noble mood, which matches the sense of something grand and imposing. The other terms refer to different ideas: *expressivo* asks for emotional expressiveness; *dolce* means sweetly and softly; *divisi* instructs players to split into parts. So the term that best captures majestic, dignified style is *maestoso*.

8. Which term means "animated, rapid"?

In music, how a passage should feel is shown by expression and tempo markings. *mosso* signals movement and energy—literally “moved” or with motion—so it directs the music to be more animated, often with a quicker feel than what came before. That makes it the best fit for “animated, rapid.” *Con anima* means with spirit or life, and *con spirito* means with spirit; both describe liveliness, but not specifically a faster or more animated speed. *Dolce* means sweetly, softly, which is the opposite of what “animated, rapid” calls for.

9. Which term is defined as a metrical pause or break in a verse where one phrase ends and another begins?

A caesura is a natural pause within a line of verse where one phrase ends and another begins. This break shapes rhythm and breath, letting a reader or singer slow slightly or catch their breath before continuing, and it often appears where punctuation or a thoughtful pause occurs in performance. The other terms don't fit because they describe speed or a hold in music rather than a mid-line division in poetry. *Grave* and *lento* are tempo markings telling you to slow down, and *fermata* is a held pause on a note, not a pause inside a verse.

10. Which term means "The sound produced by combining two vowels into a single syllable"?

The sound produced by combining two vowels into a single syllable is called a diphthong. A diphthong is a vowel sound that starts with one vowel quality and glides into another within the same syllable, as in the "oi" of coin or the "ou" of house. In singing, recognizing diphthongs helps with clear diction and smooth vocal lines, since two vowels can be sung as one connected syllable rather than two separate beats. The other terms are performance directions: con anima means with life or spirit, con spirito means with spirit, and dolce means sweet. They describe expression and tone, not the phonetic makeup of vowels, so they don't fit the definition.
