In contrast, other methods listed, such as surveys and analysis, observations, historical research, or social media interactions, may not directly involve the same level of engagement with subjects as defined under the regulations, and thus do not encapsulate the comprehensive requirements of obtaining data from living individuals as stipulated in federal regulations.
