John Cabot, an Italian explorer, was commissioned by Henry VIII of England in 1497 to seek a northwest passage to Asia. The Principle of Plenitude refers to the idea that a full diversity of beings is better than a lack thereof, the Principle of Sufficient Reason posits that everything must have a reason or cause, and the Law of Noncontradiction states that contradictory statements cannot both be true at the same time. These concepts, while important, are distinct from the idea of simplicity in explanation that Occam's Razor embodies.
