Being a social activist may involve advocacy work but does not inherently involve elected office. A philosophy professor usually emphasizes academic work rather than legislative responsibilities, and while a lawyer may frequently engage in justice issues, it does not necessarily correlate with a role in government unless they specifically pursue a political career. Thus, the profile suggests a higher likelihood of Lydia's role being a Congresswoman.
