The emphasis on practical experience is crucial for preparing interns to meet the demands of professional practice and to foster the competencies needed for safe and effective patient care upon licensure. Other options do not reflect the minimum training hours as specified in the regulations and hence do not fulfill the educational and practical training requirements mandated by the Board. Understanding the rationale behind this specific hour requirement helps underscore the importance of comprehensive training in pharmaceutical care.
