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Explanations

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1. Res ipsa loquitur is used when:

- A. The injury would have occurred regardless of defendant's action.
- B. The injury is caused by patient noncompliance.

Res ipsa loquitur is used when the harm is of a kind that would not ordinarily occur in the absence of negligence and there is no direct evidence pinpointing the defendant's act. This doctrine allows a jury or judge to infer negligence from the very occurrence of the injury, shifting some proof burden to the defense to show there was no negligence or to provide an alternate explanation. In medicine, it applies when the injury is not something that would typically happen without careless conduct and the instrumentality causing the harm was under the defendant's control, with no patient factors or other explanations at hand. So the description that the injury would not ordinarily occur without negligence and there is no direct evidence precisely matches the essence of res ipsa loquitur.

Protecting the patient's privacy is the default. Information about a patient should not be shared with third-party payers without the patient's permission, and any disclosure beyond what is strictly necessary for payment should be obtained through consent. This respects the patient's autonomy and privacy, and guides clinicians to share only what is needed and to inform patients about when and what data will be shared. In practice, you should only reveal the minimum information required for billing and obtain consent for broader sharing, which fits the principle that confidentiality is maintained regardless of who is paying.

Ensuring continuity of care is the key issue here. When a physician plans to retire, there's an ethical obligation to avoid abandoning patients and to help them transition to another provider. Providing documentation at least 30 days in advance gives patients time to find a new clinician, arrange for transfer of records, and understand how their care will continue after the physician leaves. Written notice also supports proper handoffs, so urgent or ongoing needs aren't left unmanaged. The notice should include practical details such as the retirement date, how patients can obtain copies of their records, and referrals or recommendations for alternative providers. In many professional guidelines, this level of advance notice is viewed as a reasonable standard to protect patient safety and autonomy.

The fundamental obligation is to maintain transparency and protect patient welfare by managing any ties to industry so they don't bias care. Disclosing relationships with industry allows others to understand potential sources of influence and maintain accountability. Limiting promotional interactions helps keep professional encounters focused on objective, evidence-based information rather than marketing tactics. Actively avoiding conflicts of interest preserves trust in the physician–patient relationship and ensures clinical decisions are guided by what is best for the patient, not by or rate of industry benefit. In short, openness, boundaries, and avoidance of conflicts of interest together uphold professional integrity and patient-centered care.

Physicians have a legal duty to report gunshot wounds under public health and jurisdictional statutes. The aim is to protect patient safety while enabling public health surveillance and law enforcement investigations. Reports are typically required promptly and include essential details to aid the response, with confidentiality preserved as allowed by law. This obligation is not limited to minors, nor is reporting optional or never required; the duty generally applies across cases and ages.

Maintaining professional boundaries is essential in physician-patient care; dual relationships threaten this by risking impaired judgment and boundary violations. When a physician has another role with the patient—such as a friend, family member, business associate, or financial partner—the line between personal interest and patient welfare can blur. That can bias clinical decisions, leading to care that serves the physician's interests rather than the patient's best interests. It also opens the door to boundaries being crossed or exploited, which can diminish trust, undermine informed consent, and compromise safety and quality of care. In short, the patient's welfare and the therapeutic alliance depend on objective, unbiased judgment, which dual relationships jeopardize.

Public health reporting hinges on a disease's potential to spread quickly or to cause serious harm. That practical need is what makes a disease reportable. Other ideas like being rarely contagious but deadly, or being routinely screened in all patients, don't capture why reporting is required. Reporting isn't about universal screening or mere public interest; it's about enabling timely public health action in the face of transmission risk or serious harm.

Contributory negligence is when a patient's own actions contribute to the harm by not following reasonable medical advice or treatment. In this case, the patient voluntarily neglects to follow advice, and that nonadherence contributes to the injury. That noncompliance can limit or eliminate the patient's ability to recover damages, depending on the legal framework. The other scenarios describe issues like lack of informed consent or a baseless lawsuit, which are not about the patient's failure to follow medical guidance.

9. A physician receives a substantial gift from a pharmaceutical company. What ethical issue does this raise?

Receiving a substantial gift from a pharmaceutical company creates a real conflict of interest that can threaten objective medical judgment and the trust between physician and patient. Even with the best intentions, financial ties to industry can subtly influence prescribing patterns, treatment recommendations, or the way information is presented, raising concerns about bias. This situation also tests professional boundaries, since a valuable gift can create a perceived obligation or indebtedness that alters how the physician interacts with patients and colleagues. To protect patient welfare and maintain trust, clinicians should disclose such relationships and follow institutional conflict-of-interest policies, or avoid accepting meaningful gifts altogether. This topic is less about privacy, or about beneficence in planning alone, or about obtaining consent for medications—the central ethical issue here is how industry gifts can bias care and compromise professional boundaries.

Respect confidentiality with minors, but set clear, age-appropriate limits that include safety and legal considerations. Start by honoring the minor's request and keeping information confidential as much as possible, while encouraging involvement from parents or guardians in the overall care. Have an open discussion with the minor about what information will be shared, with whom, and under what circumstances confidentiality might be limited. You should explain that limits exist for safety concerns or abuse and that you will comply with applicable laws, which may require disclosure to a parent, guardian, or authorities. This approach helps build trust and supports the minor's autonomy while ensuring protection and legal compliance. Sharing information with parents without regard to the minor's wishes undermines trust and autonomy, and breaking confidentiality without clear safety or legal reasons is not appropriate; ignoring the request altogether fails to engage with the minor's needs and the ethical duty to preserve confidentiality when possible.
