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Explanations

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1. Which action best exemplifies primary prevention for violence?

- A. Providing shelter after an incident
- B. Screening for abuse in clinics

Focusing on preventing violence before it happens is the goal of primary prevention. Educating the community about recognizing risk factors does exactly that—people learn to identify warning signs and understand what increases the chance of violence, which can lead to early steps to avoid or mitigate it and to changing norms that contribute to violence. Shelter after an incident is about responding to violence after it occurs, which is crisis intervention and falls under addressing consequences rather than preventing the initial act. Screening for abuse in clinics detects abuse early and connects people to services, which is secondary prevention aimed at preventing further harm after violence has begun. Referring victims to community agencies helps after the fact, aligning with tertiary prevention. So, educating the community about recognizing risk factors best exemplifies primary prevention.

This foundational information also supports informed planning for goals of care and coping strategies as the disease evolves. Prescribing medications, scheduling physical therapy, or arranging a home health aide are actions that depend on specific medical assessment, diagnostic confirmation, and resource availability. They may be appropriate later, but they aren't the primary objective of an initial educational encounter, which centers on informing and preparing the family for what lies ahead.

Bending at the waist to pick up a heavy object places the load on the lower back and uses the spine as a lever, so the back muscles do most of the work. This creates high compressive and shear forces on the lumbar discs and raises the risk of strains or disc injuries, especially if the load is heavy or you twist while lifting. The safer approach is to hinge at the hips and knees, keep the back straight, hold the object close to the body, and lift with the leg muscles. Using a dolly or hoist reduces or eliminates manual lifting, further lowering risk. A back brace by itself doesn't correct the lifting technique and can give a false sense of security, so the hazardous factor remains the bending at the waist.

Understanding patient expectations and goals is central to patient-centered communication. By inviting the patient to describe how they expect a complementary therapy to affect their health, you open a collaborative dialogue that respects their values, uncovers beliefs about healing, and reveals realistic goals and concerns. This approach helps you assess safety, potential interactions with conventional treatments, and the evidence behind the therapy, all while supporting shared decision-making and the patient's sense of control over their care. Dismissing or dictating treatment, telling someone to abandon traditional practices, or providing only written information misses these essential elements. Directives can erode trust and autonomy; dismissing practices can alienate the patient and hinder adherence; and relying solely on written materials fails to engage the patient, verify understanding, or address individual concerns. So, inviting the patient to articulate their expectations is the most effective way to support patient-centered communication about complementary therapies.

A webhook is an HTTP callback that the CMS fires when certain events happen, so external systems get notified in real time. You configure a target URL and choose which events to trigger on (like a post being published, updated, or deleted; a new comment; or a user action). When that event occurs, the CMS sends an HTTP request (usually a POST) to the specified URL with a payload describing the event, often in JSON. The receiving system then processes the data and can take automated actions, such as updating an external database or search index, triggering a build in a CI/CD pipeline, posting a message to a chat channel, or starting another workflow. Including a secret or signature helps the receiving system verify the request's authenticity, and using HTTPS protects the data in transit. The payload typically includes details like what resource changed, its ID, timestamps, and the new state, enabling downstream systems to react appropriately. This isn't a user notification center (that would internal messages to users), nor a scheduling tool for posts, nor a database backup method. Instead, it provides real-time, event-driven communication from the CMS to other services, enabling seamless integrations and automated workflows.

Understanding the patient's living situation and how they perceive it is the priority because housing status directly shapes safety, access to care, and how well treatment plans can be followed. Knowing where they'll sleep, what resources they have, and how they understand their options helps you plan immediate needs (like shelter or social services) and set up a realistic discharge and follow-up. Without that context, other steps may be less feasible or effective in the real world of homelessness. While checking vital signs or giving guidance is important, they hinge on being able to act within the patient's living situation, making understanding that situation the strongest starting point.

Limiting extension cords reduces electrical hazards because these cords are meant for temporary connections, not as a substitute for fixed wiring. When cords are used for longer periods or to power several devices, they can overheat, get damaged, or have insulation wear and break; this creates a fire or shock risk. Cords can also become tripping hazards or be pinched or crushed, which further elevates danger. By relying less on extension cords, you keep loads on properly installed outlets that are designed for continuous use. If you must extend power, ensure cords are in good condition, rated for the load, kept out of traffic, and never used to daisy-chain multiple cords or to power high-wattage devices from a single outlet. Damaging practices like placing cords under rugs or leaving damaged cords in place are especially risky because they conceal heat sources or expose live wires, increasing the chance of fire or shock.

The best approach is to have configurable retention periods for each data type, automated purging to enforce those rules, and user data export options so people can retrieve or move their information as needed. Configurability lets admins adapt to changing laws and different data—like profiles, posts, comments, and messages—without rewriting the system each time. Automated purging ensures the rules are applied consistently and without manual intervention, reducing the chance of human error. User data export options fulfill data-access and portability rights, making it easier for users to obtain their data or take it elsewhere. Hard-coded, non-configurable periods lack flexibility and quickly become out of date as regulations evolve or as organizational needs change. Saying there's no impact on compliance overlooks legal requirements that demand proper data handling. Purging data automatically without a way for users to export or access their information can violate rights and erode trust. By combining configurable retention, automation, and export capabilities, the policy supports compliance, efficiency, and respectful handling of user data. In practice, map each data type to a retention window, automate the purge process, and provide clear self-service export tools for users.

This lets teams compare changes, merge different edits, and roll back to a clean baseline when necessary. Audit trails complement that by recording exactly who made each change and when, providing accountability, clarity, and a transparent progression of edits. With both in place, collaborators can work in parallel with confidence, resolve conflicts efficiently, and trust that the evolution of the content is well-documented. The other options misstate the purpose or impact: preventing editing entirely undermines collaboration, audit trails don't replace the need for version histories, and these tools aren't meant to slow down work but to organize and safeguard it.

The other options blur or reverse these roles or claim they're the same, which doesn't fit how CMSs typically separate content (blocks) from interactive components (widgets).
