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Explanations

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1. If the interphone system is inoperative, which communication methods can crew use to communicate with passengers?

- A. Public address system if available, visual signals, and standardized hand signals.**
- B. Public address announcements only.

When the interphone is inoperative, you still need clear, immediate ways to reach all passengers. Use the public address system if it's still available to deliver concise instructions to the cabin. Pair that with visual signals to capture attention and reinforce the message, such as turning on cabin lights or making deliberate, observable gestures. Standardized hand signals are essential too, because they convey specific commands quickly and can be understood by everyone, regardless of language or hearing ability. This mix provides redundancy and clarity, ensuring passengers receive and understand safety instructions promptly. Shouting or clapping can create confusion or panic and isn't a reliable method, and waiting for ground crew would delay critical information.

2. How do you obtain the First Aid Kit?

Accessing the First Aid Kit is done by opening the cabinet door and pulling out the dedicated drawer that holds the kit. This setup lets you retrieve the kit quickly in a single, straightforward motion without removing the entire cabinet or rummaging through items one by one. It keeps the contents organized and secure, ready to be carried to the scene. Breaking seals or removing items individually would slow you down or risk missing components, and taking the whole kit out of the stowage instead of using the drawer adds unnecessary steps.

3. What is the correct sequence to turn off the POB?

- A. Remove mask first, then turn off the POB**
- B. Turn off the POB first, then remove the mask

When handling a portable oxygen bottle and its mask, you want oxygen to be controlled smoothly as you remove the equipment from your face. The safest sequence is to take the mask off first, then turn off the POB. Removing the mask while the oxygen supply is still active avoids pulling on a live line and lets you detach the mask with the hose freed, reducing the chance of struggle or leaks. Once the mask is off, turning off the POB stops the oxygen flow and lets you safely stow both items. Turning off the POB first can make mask removal awkward or awkwardly timed, and leaving the POB on while you remove the mask keeps the system active longer than necessary.

4. What must you be cautious about when using Halon extinguishers?

Halon extinguishing agents kill fire mainly by interrupting the chemical reactions in the flame and by displacing some of the surrounding air, reducing the amount of breathable oxygen. Because of that, the real hazard isn't cooling the fire or soaking the area with moisture; it's creating an oxygen-deficient environment. The key precaution is to treat the space as potentially unsafe to breathe after Halon discharge: ventilate or evacuate as needed and avoid entering until the atmosphere is confirmed safe. Halon's action isn't about cooling or moisture, and you should not rely on those factors to manage the fire; the safety focus is on preserving a breathable atmosphere and preventing exposure.

5. What is the Emergency Flashlight primarily used for, and what is a notable capability?

Emergency flashlights are designed to provide reliable lighting when aircraft power is unavailable, so crew and passengers can see to exit and operate safety procedures. They are battery-powered and built to work independently of the airplane's electrical system. A key capability is being waterproof or highly water-resistant, so the light remains usable if the cabin gets wet or in a ditching situation. That combination—emergency lighting plus operation in water—best fits the item. The other ideas miss the essential point: they imply dependence on an external power source, restrict use to signaling/navigation, or claim it isn't waterproof, which isn't consistent with how these flashlights are built for aviation safety.

6. During preflight, which item must be attached to the Thermal Containment Bag with a plastic seal?

- A. Thermal Protective Gloves attached to the bag with a plastic seal**

In preflight checks, tamper-evident seals are used to verify that essential protective gear is present and ready to use. The Thermal Containment Bag must have its Thermal Protective Gloves attached with a plastic seal because the gloves are the critical item kept with the bag, and the seal shows the gloves haven't been removed or replaced since the last check. This ensures quick, reliable access to protection during a thermal event and confirms the bag's contents are intact. The other items listed aren't part of this sealing requirement for the Thermal Containment Bag, so they don't fit the shown practice.

7. What is the Manual Release Tool used for?

- A. Adjusting oxygen flow rate
- B. Manually deploy oxygen masks from their compartment**

The Manual Release Tool is used to manually deploy oxygen masks from their compartment. In an emergency, if the automatic deployment system doesn't release the masks, the flight crew uses this tool to unlock or release the mask panel so the masks drop for passengers to use. It isn't for adjusting oxygen flow, testing the masks, or securing the oxygen bottle, which involve different procedures and equipment.

8. Which action closes the zipper on the Thermal Containment Bag?

- A. Pull red loop
- B. Press top seam
- C. Pull black loop to close zipper**
- D. Pour water

Closing the Thermal Containment Bag relies on using the zipper slider, which is operated by a color-coded pull. To seal the bag, grasp and pull the black loop; this moves the zipper along its track to the closed position, ensuring the contents stay contained and the bag remains properly sealed. The red loop is not used to close the zipper, and pressing the top seam won't engage the zipper mechanism. Pouring water has no role in closing the bag and would defeat the containment purpose.

9. Where should you stow the PBE after use?

- A. Under a seat away from fire location.
- B. In overhead bin or under a seat away from fire location.**
- C. In cockpit closet.
- D. In lavatory trash bin.

After use, the PBE must be returned to an approved stowage area so it stays protected and ready for the next need. The best practice is to place it in an overhead bin or under a seat, as long as it's kept away from heat sources or fire. This keeps it secure, prevents clutter or obstruction, and ensures quick access in an emergency. Stowing it in the lavatory trash bin is unsafe and unhygienic, and the cockpit closet isn't an approved PBE storage location.

10. After exiting the aircraft, which action inflates the crew life vest?

- A. Upon exiting the aircraft
- B. Pull down on both red tabs to inflate**
- C. If inflation fails, blow into the manual inflation tubes
- D. Push on purge valves in the manual inflation tubes

The action tested is how a crew life vest is manually activated for inflation. To inflate, you must release the gas from the CO2 cartridges by pulling down on both red inflation tabs. Doing both tabs ensures that the vest gets fully inflated, providing buoyancy after you exit the aircraft. If the CO2 system doesn't inflate the vest, you have a backup: you can blow into the manual inflation tubes to inflate. Purge valves aren't used to inflate; they are for venting or deflating, so pushing them would not inflate the vest.
