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Explanations

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1. ASCENT means?

- A. The act of landing
- B. The action of an airplane climbing**
- C. The motion of turning
- D. The approach path

In aviation, ascent refers to the aircraft gaining altitude, i.e., climbing upward after takeoff or during any climb toward cruising altitude. This is exactly the action described by the phrase "the action of an airplane climbing," so it fits the term ascent. Why the other ideas don't fit: landing is the descent and touchdown phase, not climbing. Turning is changing direction, which can occur during climbs but isn't what ascent means. The approach path is the specific route used during the final approach to land, typically involving descent, not the upward climb described by ascent.

2. DESCENT is defined as?

Descent is the phase of flight where the aircraft purposely reduces its altitude, moving from higher to lower levels to reach the approach path for landing. This is the step that sets up a stable approach and allows you to configure the airplane for landing, manage airspeed, and coordinate with air traffic control as you descend toward the destination. Moving from lower to higher altitude would be ascent, which is the opposite. De-icing is a separate procedure focused on removing or preventing ice, and a flight delay is a scheduling issue, not a flight-path term.

Flight schedules are published in a central, publicly accessible source so everyone can check up-to-date times and routes. The United website serves as that official source for published schedules, providing current flight times, routes, and any updates in real time. This makes it the standard place to find the schedule, ensuring both customers and crew see the same information. Other places don't fit as well: the maintenance manual is for aircraft upkeep information, not flight timings; the crew lounge is not the official, consistently updated source for schedules; and the company training portal is intended for courses and instructional content, not day-to-day flight timetables.

4. (QT) stands for which of the following in flight operations?

In flight operations, QT is used to denote a rapid turnaround at the gate—the Quick Turn between a plane's arrival and its next departure. It's all about getting the aircraft ready for the next leg as quickly as possible while still maintaining safety and service standards. This includes coordinating cabin cleaning, restocking, catering, baggage handling, and any safety checks so the plane can depart on time. The other phrases don't reflect a standard term used in this context, so they don't fit the common operational meaning as well.

5. Which acronym refers to the main entry door in the cabin?

In aviation terminology, door labels use concise acronyms so crew can quickly identify the correct exit. The main entry door in the cabin is designated as the Main Cabin Door, abbreviated MCD. That makes Main Cabin Door the correct expansion, since it reflects the primary access point used for boarding, deplaning, and emergency procedures. The other phrases aren't standard terms used to label that door and wouldn't appear on official markings or briefings.

6. What does SA stand for?

In airline lingo, SA stands for Space Available. This is the standard shorthand used on standby lists and flight announcements to indicate that there are unoccupied seats on the flight and that a standby passenger or extra crew member could be accommodated if space allows. The phrase conveys whether the flight can accept additional passengers, rather than implying any specific assignment of a seat. While the other options convey related ideas, they aren't the commonly used designation: Space Availability isn't the established term used in communications, Space Assign implies actively assigning space rather than reporting availability, and Seat Availability is understandable but not the standard SA form. So Space Available is the correct interpretation.

Flight plans are the formal, preflight plan filed with air traffic control that outlines the aircraft's intended route, altitudes, fuel plan, and other operational details based on the latest information for the route. This plan is submitted to ATC before takeoff so controllers can sequence traffic, provide routing and altitude assignments, and assist in locating the aircraft if needed. It isn't just a ground operations schedule, a list of passenger meals, or a maintenance log, which serve different purposes.

8. What is a galley in an aircraft?

The galley is the area in the aircraft dedicated to food and beverage service. It's where meals and snacks are stored and prepared for service, and it houses the equipment flight attendants use during service—carts, ovens or warming devices, coffee makers, refrigerators, and waste bins. It's not a crew rest area (that's for sleeping), not an engine compartment, and not a passenger seating area. So describing it as a compartment where food is stored best captures its role as the storage and preparation space for onboard meals and drinks.

9. The WALK AROUND refers to which of the following?

- A. The interior checks performed during boarding
- B. A post-flight maintenance procedure

The walk around is the exterior inspection of the aircraft conducted by a flight crewmember as part of preflight and after-landing checks to ensure the airplane is safe to fly. This isn't about interior cabin checks or maintenance actions; it's a safety review of the outside of the aircraft. During preflight, the crew member looks for obvious damage, fluid leaks, missing or loose components, and checks that exterior surfaces, tires and landing gear, engines and nacelles, flight control surfaces, lights, and pitot/static ports appear normal and unobstructed. After landing, the walk around serves to spot any new damage or issues that could affect safety on the next flight. Cleaning or polishing the exterior isn't part of this safety inspection, and interior boarding checks or maintenance procedures are handled separately.

10. What term refers to the landing gear?

The main idea here is aviation terminology for aircraft parts. The landing gear is the undercarriage that supports the airplane on the ground, including wheels, struts, and the mechanisms that raise and lower it. In practice, this system is simply referred to as the gear. So the term that refers to the landing gear is gear. Fuselage is the main body of the aircraft, galley is the kitchen area, and headwind is wind blowing opposite to the aircraft's travel.
