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Explanations

Community and social service occupations, on the other hand, center on addressing people's social or emotional needs, providing counseling or support, and helping individuals connect to resources and services outside the traditional medical procedure. That's why the best description contrasts these two groups as jobs that assist providers in clinical settings with roles that help people with social or emotional challenges. The other options blur the boundaries or rely on assumptions (like testing as a defining task, administrative versus clinical duties, or licensing/volunteering) that don't reliably differentiate the two categories.

Medicare Part D provides prescription drug coverage for people enrolled in Medicare. It's optional and offered through private plans approved by Medicare. To get Part D, you need Part A or Part B, and you enroll in a standalone prescription drug plan or a Medicare Advantage plan that includes drug coverage. Benefits vary by plan and depend on the formulary (which drugs are covered), drug tiers, and cost-sharing (monthly premium, potential deductible, and copays or coinsurance). This coverage applies only to prescription medications, not to hospital inpatient services (that's Part A) or routine dental and vision services. It isn't a Medigap supplemental plan, which are separate policies that help with other out-of-pocket costs. When you enroll late, penalties can increase premiums.

The idea being tested is enabling patients to access their own health information securely online through a dedicated patient portal. A patient/parent portal is designed for login authentication, encryption, and role-based access so patients or parents can view test results, visit summaries, medications, immunizations, and messages with their providers, as well as appointment details. Interoperability describes how well different health IT systems exchange data, not how patients access it. The Master Patient Index links patient records across systems, but isn't a patient-facing site. Clinical Decision Support helps clinicians with care decisions, not patient viewing. Therefore, the secure online site for patients to view health information is the patient/parent portal.

Antibiotic resistance means the bacteria causing the infection have evolved defenses that let them survive exposure to antibiotics that would normally kill them or stop their growth. Because of this, standard treatments may fail, and doctors may need to use a different antibiotic, higher doses, longer courses, or combination therapy. Resistance can arise through mutations in the bacteria or by acquiring resistance genes from other bacteria, often driven by antibiotic use in medicine and agriculture. This helps explain why some infections persist or recur despite treatment and why stewardship is important to prevent further resistance. In contrast, an infection that responds to antibiotics is not resistant, a viral illness like influenza isn't treated effectively with antibiotics, and an allergy to antibiotics is a separate issue related to adverse reactions rather than bacterial susceptibility.

It enables authorized clinicians and researchers to access the data from different locations, supports scalable storage as needs grow, and facilitates collaboration and rapid data sharing. It also strengthens resilience through centralized backups and disaster recovery, since data can be duplicated and protected across multiple locations. When implemented with proper security measures—encryption, access controls, audit logs, and compliance with privacy laws—cloud computing can be secure and compliant while offering cost efficiency and flexibility. The other statements describe running everything on local hardware, computing only on physical devices, or moving data via physical media, which do not reflect cloud-based access and storage.

That's why the group described—poor, elderly, or sick individuals with no one to care for them—is the best fit. While veterans, middle-class professionals, or immigrant laborers might need housing at times, almshouses were specifically aimed at those lacking family caretakers and with limited means.

Why this fits best: it captures the essence of outpatient, non-admission care—patients are treated and discharged rather than admitted for a hospital stay. The other options describe scenarios involving overnight hospitalization or hospital-based services, which do not define ambulatory care. For example, inpatient surgical care requires admission, and 24-hour hospital emergency services often lead to admission or longer stays rather than staying outpatient. Home-based care can be outpatient, but ambulatory care isn't limited to home settings or to palliative care alone; it encompasses a broader range of non-overnight medical services in various outpatient settings.

Medical school admissions expect an undergraduate education with science prerequisites, not just a high school credential or a shorter degree. This combination shows you've built the foundational knowledge and study habits needed for the demanding medical curriculum and demonstrates readiness to handle advanced coursework, the MCAT, and the overall preclinical and clinical training. High school alone doesn't prove college-level preparation, and an associate degree usually doesn't meet the standard expectation of a completed bachelor's plus the defined science prerequisites. A PhD, while valuable, doesn't substitute for having a bachelor's degree with those prerequisite courses; many applicants with PhDs still complete or demonstrate the same undergraduate requirements.
