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## **Explanations**

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## 1. Which reading level focuses on multi-syllable and morphemic analysis?

*Transitional Readers are typically targeted for instruction that includes multi-syllable and morphemic analysis. At this stage, students are moving beyond simple, single-syllable words and beginning to tackle more complex vocabulary that includes multiple syllables and varied morphemes (the smallest units of meaning in language). During this developmental phase, students benefit from learning how to break down larger words into their constituent parts to aid in decoding and comprehension. This involves recognizing prefixes, suffixes, and root words, which helps students understand how different words are formed and how meaning can change depending on the morphemes used. In contrast, Emergent Readers are still grasping the fundamentals of reading, such as letter recognition and basic phonics. Fluent Readers exhibit proficiency in reading and can handle more complex texts but may not focus specifically on morphemic analysis. Advanced Readers are often involved with nuanced and abstract texts, using advanced comprehension strategies but may not be the primary focus for learning about syllables and morphemes as foundational skills.*

Additionally, the requirement that all books must be classics does not apply, as Guided Reading encompasses a diverse range of texts that cater to the interests and abilities of students.*

Recognizing vowel diphthongs is essential in phonetics and literacy education, as they affect pronunciation and can influence a reader's ability to decode words accurately. In contrast, the other options consist of short vowel sounds: "Pin" has a short 'i,' "Step" includes a short 'e,' and "Cat" features a short 'a.' None of these options include the merging of two vowel sounds that characterizes a diphthong.*

*Developing reading fluency involves strategies that improve a reader's speed, accuracy, and expression while reading. Readers theater engages students in performing a script, which not only increases their reading practice but also encourages expressive reading and comprehension as they interpret characters. In contrast, watching videos, while it can be an engaging activity and beneficial for exposure to language and storytelling, does not directly engage students in the active practice of reading. Therefore, it does not contribute to the development of reading fluency in the same way the other options do.*
