In contrast, the other options propose a more hopeful assessment of Sam's prospects. The statements about being optimistic, believing in inevitable failure, or suggesting Sam's future confined to independent films all indicate an underlying belief that there could still be opportunities or paths for success, which does not align with the sentiment captured in the chosen answer. The emphasis on having 'given up' illustrates a definitive and somewhat resigned stance towards Sam Bowker's Hollywood ambitions.

For instance, stating "I was walking to school last week" points to a past occurrence, and "I am walking to school regularly" introduces an element of variability rather than emphasizing the daily commitment. Thus, the choice that reflects a consistent daily behavior is the one that accurately transforms the original statement.

An understanding of the financial implications during aggressive competition suggests that re-evaluating and possibly overhauling strategies is essential for recovery and future growth.
