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Explanations

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1. Which intermodal tank has a capacity of 4500-5000 gallons?

- A. IM-101
- B. IM-102
- C. Type 7 (cryogenic) intermodal tank**
- D. Type 5 pressure intermodal tank

Intermodal tank types vary by the service conditions they're built for, and capacity ranges reflect those designs. The 4,500–5,000 gallon range is characteristic of Type 7 intermodal tanks, which are cryogenic and built to store very cold liquids like liquefied gases. Their vacuum-insulated, double-walled construction prioritizes maintaining low temperatures, and that insulation setup leads to a typical capacity in this range. Other options aren't cryogenic tanks, so their typical use and design differ. IM-101 and IM-102 are non-cryogenic chemical tanks used for various liquids, with capacities that don't specifically target the cryogenic range. Type 5 pressure tanks are designed for high-pressure gases and have different structural requirements and capacity ranges, not tuned to cryogenic storage.

2. In the mnemonic, what does the word 'Cats' denote?

The word that "Cats" stands for is corrosive. Corrosives are substances that can burn or wear away skin, eyes, metals, and other materials on contact. The image of a cat eating away at things is a handy cue for this kind of damage, which is why it's used to remind you that the term represents corrosive hazards. Toxic or poison describe systemic harm from exposure rather than local tissue or material destruction, and explosive refers to a rapid release of energy—neither fits the cue as well as corrosive does.

3. What is the typical pressure range for non-pressure fixed facilities?

Non-pressure fixed facilities are designed to operate at essentially atmospheric pressure, with only tiny fluctuations. That means the pressure is around 0 psig, i.e., just above or equal to ambient, typically staying within a narrow window like 0 to 0.5 psig. The other ranges involve substantial pressure above ambient (tens of psi or more), which would classify the equipment as pressurized rather than non-pressure. So the 0 to 0.5 psig range best fits the description.

4. What is the capacity of dry bulk cargo tanks?

- A. 1500 cubic feet

Capacity refers to the space inside a cargo tank that can actually hold bulk material, expressed in cubic feet. For dry bulk cargo tanks, a common per-tank size used in practice is about 1500 cubic feet, which is roughly 42.5 cubic meters. This per-tank capacity is what you use to estimate how much cargo weight can be loaded (weight depends on cargo density), and to figure total capacity when there are multiple tanks. The value 1500 cubic feet reflects that standard size, making it the best choice.

5. What is vapor pressure?

Vapor pressure is the pressure exerted by the vapor that forms above a liquid when the two phases are in balance at a specific temperature. In a closed system, molecules continuously evaporate from the liquid surface and some return as they condense; at a given temperature, the rate of evaporation equals the rate of condensation, and the vapor above the liquid settles at a characteristic pressure—the vapor pressure. This pressure rises with temperature because more molecules have enough energy to escape into the vapor phase. Boiling occurs when this vapor pressure matches the surrounding atmospheric pressure. The other descriptions don't capture this specific concept: atmospheric pressure is the external pressure on the system, not the vapor pressure of the liquid; the pressure of gas in a closed container could include many gases and isn't necessarily the vapor pressure; and the partial pressure of a non-condensable gas refers to its share of the total pressure, not the pressure of the liquid's vapor in equilibrium.

6. Which feature identifies the vapor dome roof tank?

Vapor dome roof tanks are identified by a domed, bulging shape on top of the fixed roof. That large bulge is the dome itself, which creates a controlled vapor space above the liquid and helps manage hydrocarbon vapors. The other options don't define this roof type: a ladder to the center isn't unique to a vapor dome, an external drain is a bottom feature, and the idea of "two roofs" isn't how a vapor dome is described. So the giant bulge on top is the characteristic feature that signals a vapor dome roof tank.

7. Which hazard designation corresponds to Spontaneously Combustible?

- A. Hazard Division 5.2

Self-heating leading to ignition is the behavior that defines spontaneously combustible materials within the flammable solids category. In hazard classifications, there is a specific division for substances that ignite without an external ignition source because they heat up on their own as they oxidize. That division is the one used for Spontaneously Combustible materials. So the correct hazard designation is Division 4.2, which signals to handlers to store these materials away from heat, friction, and oxidizers and to manage them with extra care to prevent heat buildup. Other divisions cover related but distinct risks: flammable solids that ignite readily under normal conditions, solids that are dangerous when wetted, oxidizers, and organic peroxides.

8. Which feature identifies a cone roof fixed storage tank?

This item tests recognizing the cone-shaped top of a fixed-roof storage tank. A cone roof is identified by its conical cap—straight panels sloping up to a central apex. That distinct cone shape, welded to the tank shell, is what sets this design apart from other fixed-roof types. A flat roof has no slope, a geodesic or dome roof is curved with multiple panels forming a rounded surface, and a spherical top would be a smooth curved ball-like shape. So the cone-shaped roof is the defining feature.

9. In the hazmat mnemonic, what does the word 'Poison' stand for?

- A. Radioactive
- B. Gases
- C. Corrosive
- D. Poisonous/Infectious Substances**

In this hazmat mnemonic, POISON points to materials that are harmful because they are poisonous to people or capable of spreading disease. So it covers poisonous substances and infectious substances, which fall under Class 6 (toxic substances) and Class 6.2 (infectious substances) in hazmat classifications. That's why the correct choice describes poisonous/infectious substances. The other options refer to different hazard classes—radioactive is a separate Class 7, gases are Class 2, and corrosive is Class 8—none of which are what POISON represents in the mnemonic.

10. Which NFPA 704 color indicates instability hazards?

- A. Blue
- B. Red
- C. Yellow
- D. White

NFPA 704 communicates hazards with a diamond that has four colored fields. Instability (reactivity) hazards are shown in the yellow field. The blue field covers health hazards, the red field covers flammability hazards, and the white field notes special hazards like oxidizers or water reactivity. Each field can carry a number from 0 to 4 to indicate severity, with higher numbers meaning greater hazard. Since instability relates to how a substance may react under certain conditions, the yellow color is the one that signals that risk.
