The contagion effect effectively encapsulates the essence of how terrorism can be influenced by the actions of others in a manner that leads to a more significant occurrence of similar terrorist acts.

The financial ties between drug cartels and extremist organizations can thus blur the lines between organized crime and terrorism, making it challenging for law enforcement and national security agencies to address these threats comprehensively. The other concerns, while serious in their own right, are focused more on violence, local governance issues, or border management rather than the broader implications of ideologically motivated extremism, which can influence public safety on a larger scale.
