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Explanations

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1. Which term best describes the medieval drama that teaches Christian morals through allegory?

The main idea here is naming the broad category that includes medieval plays that convey Christian lessons through allegory. For example, a character who stays late to help peers, listens without interrupting, and earns praise for reliability demonstrates kindness and dependability through actions and how others respond, not by being told "they are kind." The other options describe traits directly stated, inner thoughts presented as direct statements, or personality imagined from setting, which don't capture the indirect, behavior-and-reaction method. So the best description is showing character through actions, dialogue, thoughts, and effects on others.

Minor characters exist to support that arc by creating situation, tension, or contrast, and their traits and growth help illuminate the themes the work explores. This combination—where the main figures propel events and the smaller figures enrich the world and highlight underlying ideas—best captures how character roles typically function. That's why the statement that major characters drive the plot, minor characters support it, and their traits and growth illuminate themes is the strongest answer. It reflects how stories depend on the main character's actions to push the narrative forward while the supporting characters enrich the experience and clarify what the work is saying about its central ideas. The other options misstate these dynamics: ascribing plot-driving power to minor characters, claiming major characters are always static, or saying only minor characters reveal theme doesn't fit how most narratives operate or how character roles interact to shape meaning.

*Ovid is the Roman poet who wrote *Metamorphoses* and *Ars Amatoria*, and his myth-filled stories and clever treatment of love inspired Shakespeare. *Metamorphoses* collects transformations from classic myths, and Shakespeare often drew on those tales for plots, imagery, and themes, weaving Ovidian motifs into his plays. *Ars Amatoria* shows his mastery of playful, intricate language about love, another thread Shakespeare explores in his own witty, romantic drama. The other options don't refer to a poet or works; Medieval Drama is a form of theater, Pathos is an emotional appeal, and Circular Logic is a logical fallacy.*

A myth is a traditional narrative that explains how something originated, often involving gods or supernatural beings. Myths address big questions about the world—how it began, why natural phenomena occur, or why customs exist—and they're tied to a culture's sacred beliefs. This distinguishes them from other narrative types: a folktale is mainly for entertainment and may include magic without centering on explaining origins within a culture's belief system; a fable is a short tale with a clear moral, usually featuring talking animals; and cultural knowledge refers to shared information about a culture rather than a storytelling form. So, the term that best fits this description is myth.

You'll see it in myths where deities act with human motives, in fables where animals talk and reason like people, and even in everyday language when we describe weather or machines as if they can think or choose. The other options aren't about giving human traits to non-human beings. Alliteration focuses on repeating initial sounds for a musical effect. Epistrophe involves repeating a word or phrase at the end of successive clauses for emphasis. Metonymy substitutes the name of something closely related for the thing itself, like saying "the White House announced" instead of "the president announced."

The phrase Storm and Stress itself captures this push—turbulent feelings, impulsive action, and a focus on the inner life over neat, measured forms. That makes the best description the emphasis on emotional intensity and personal expression, which is the hallmark of Sturm und Drang. It's not about the later label of Romanticism or the orderly traits of Classicism or Realism; it's about the raw, unrestrained emotional force and the revolt against conventional rules that Storm and Stress conveys.

Primary sources are original materials that provide direct, first-hand evidence about a topic. They are created at the time of the event or by participants themselves, so they show events without someone else's interpretation. That's why the statement that they are originals is the best description. Examples include diaries, letters, official records, photographs, and artifacts. They are not summaries, fictional works, or reviews, which are secondary sources that interpret, condense, or critique original materials.

9. What type of rhyme involves ends of lines rhyming with other end words, forming a rhyme scheme?

When rhymes occur at the ends of lines and pair with other line-ending words to create a pattern, that is end rhyme, often called external rhyme. This end-rhyme pattern is what gives a poem its rhyme scheme, like ABAB or AABB, by mapping which line ends rhyme with which. Internal rhyme, by contrast, rhymes words within a line or across lines but not at the line ends. Slant rhyme is an approximate or near rhyme, and eye rhyme relies on spelling rather than sound. So the description describes external rhyme.

10. What best defines metafiction?

Metafiction foregrounds storytelling itself, making the craft of fiction part of the narrative. This reflexive stance invites readers to question what is real within the story and what is artificial about the storytelling process. That's why this option best defines metafiction: it explicitly discusses that the work is a fiction and plays with its status as a made-up artifact. A work that ignores the reader wouldn't engage with this self-awareness, which is central to metafiction. A work that uses only dialogue focuses on a formal constraint rather than the fiction's reflection on its own nature. And a work with no plot isn't a requirement of metafiction; it can have a plot, but what sets it apart is the self-conscious discussion of its fictionality.
