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Explanations

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1. What does human language rely on?

- A. Genetic encoding alone
- B. Social convention and learning**
- C. Memory storage

Language hinges on social convention and learning. Humans are biologically equipped for language, but the actual words, structures, and norms we use come from social interaction and cultural transmission. Children pick up meaning, pronunciation, and grammar by listening, imitating, and receiving feedback within their speech community, gradually coordinating with others to form a shared system. This collaborative process explains why languages differ across communities and can even give rise to entirely new languages like sign languages when people create shared conventions together. Thinking of language as only genetic encoding would imply a fixed, universal set of rules, which isn't how language works in real human communities. Memory helps us store and recall words and rules, but it doesn't by itself create the system of signifiers and syntax that language relies on. Innate reflexes cover simple, automatic responses and don't account for the complex, rule-governed nature of language.

Conjunctions link words, phrases, or clauses together, showing how they relate within a sentence. This connecting role is what sets them apart from other parts of speech. For example, and, or, and but join items in a list or connect different ideas, helping to build more complex sentences without repeating words. In contrast, a noun names a person, place, or thing; a verb expresses an action or state; an adjective describes a noun. So the term that functions specifically to connect elements is the conjunction.

The main idea here is how the quality of instruction affects a reader's ability to make meaning from text. When instruction is inadequate, students may not learn or practice essential strategies for comprehension—like predicting, asking questions, summarizing, making inferences, or using context clues—so they struggle to understand what they read. Good instruction provides explicit modeling, guided practice, feedback, and opportunities to apply these strategies, which helps students build the skills they need to comprehend texts. Adequate instruction would not cause comprehension failure; it's the opposite, since solid teaching supports understanding. While not having enough exposure and practice can contribute to difficulties, effective instruction typically includes ample guided practice to reinforce these skills. Deficient memory capacity and functioning can affect learning in some cases, but it's not the most direct factor teachers address when focusing on reading comprehension performance in a classroom context.

Setting is the background and physical location where a story unfolds, encompassing time, place, and the surrounding environment that shape what happens and how characters experience events. It isn't just where something happens, but also the mood, culture, and social conditions that influence the narrative. The other terms describe different ideas: a paradox is a self-contradictory statement that reveals truth, point of view is the narrator's perspective, and a rhetorical question is asked for effect rather than to seek an answer. Because the question centers on where and when the story exists and how that backdrop supports the events, setting is the best fit.

The idea being tested is how a dependent clause can function as a noun inside a sentence. When a clause acts as a noun, it can stand in for a person, place, thing, or idea and serve as the subject, the direct object, or the object of a preposition. Noun clauses almost always start with question words like what, when, where, why (and sometimes with who, which, that, whose). That framing is why this type is named a noun clause. For example, What you did surprised me. Here the whole clause acts as the subject. I know what time it is. Here the clause functions as the object of know. She wondered where we would go. The clause here is the object of wondered. In contrast, an adjective clause modifies a noun and begins with who, which, or that, not acting as a noun on its own. An adverb clause modifies a verb or the whole clause and begins with words like because, although, or when. A subordinate clause is the broader umbrella term for all of these, but the one described here is specifically a noun clause.

The key idea is that the subject includes the noun and all the words that describe it or limit it. In the example "The little, fluffy kitten," the base noun is kitten, and the words The, little, and fluffy work together to describe and specify which kitten is being talked about. All of that forms a single noun phrase that serves as the subject of the sentence. In this context, the term used to refer to that complete subject—that is, the subject plus all its modifiers—is Sentence Subjective. It signals the whole unit that performs the role of the subject in the sentence, not just the bare noun alone. The modifiers are essential because they change which cat is being described and must be included when identifying the subject. This is different from referring only to the noun (which would miss the descriptive words) or to the predicate (which is the action or state of the subject). It's also broader than a single clause, which includes both a subject and a predicate.

7. In the word 'flip', what is the onset?

The main idea is understanding what the onset is in syllable structure. The onset is the initial consonant sound or cluster that comes before the vowel. In flip, the vowel is the short i sound, and the sounds before it are f and l. Together they form the onset fl. The rest of the syllable after the vowel is ip, which is the rhyme (the nucleus plus the following consonant). So the correct onset is the two-consonant cluster fl. Why the other options don't fit: a single f would miss the second consonant that belongs with the onset here, since onset can be a cluster. The sequence ip is the portion after the onset (the rhyme), not the onset. And lip would place letters around the vowel in a way that doesn't conform to the standard onset-vowel-rhyme split, since the onset is before the vowel, not including it.

Phonemic awareness is the ability to hear, identify, and manipulate the individual sounds in spoken language. This means you can hear that a word like sun is made up of three distinct sounds /s/, /u/, /n/, and you can blend those sounds to say the word, or you can manipulate them—such as changing the initial sound to form a new word (cat mat) or blending or separating sounds within a word. This skill is auditory and foundational for learning to read, because it helps students connect sounds to letters when decoding. Phonology, by contrast, is the broader study of a language's sound system, including patterns and rules for how sounds interact. Morphology focuses on morphemes, the smallest meaningful units of language. Pragmatics concerns language use in social contexts and how meaning is shaped by situation and purpose.

Connotation is the implied meaning or associations a word carries beyond its literal dictionary definition. It includes emotional tones, attitudes, and the impressions a word evokes in readers. This is what a word suggests about people, situations, or ideas, not just what it literally means. For example, "home" often connotes warmth and safety, while "house" is more neutral and merely refers to a building. In this question, the focus is on the implied meaning of a word, which is connotation. By contrast, denotation is the strict dictionary meaning, diction refers to word choice and style, and hyperbole is exaggerated for effect.

10. What term describes the effortless, automatic ability to read words accurately, quickly, and with expression?

Reading fluency is the effortless, automatic ability to read words accurately, quickly, and with expression. When a reader is fluent, decoding happens smoothly so attention can stay on what the text means rather than on sounding out each word. That combination of accuracy, speed, and appropriate expression (prosody) signals fluency and supports overall understanding. Vocabulary focuses on word meanings, which helps with comprehension but isn't the act of reading aloud with automatic speed and expression. Comprehension is the ability to understand the text, which depends on fluency but is about meaning rather than the automatic decoding process itself. Evaluation isn't related to the ability to read aloud with fluency.
