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## **Explanations**

The average value of a set of numbers is referred to as the mean. The mean is calculated by adding all the numbers in the set together and then dividing that sum by the total number of values in the set. This measure provides a central value that represents all the data points, making it a fundamental concept in statistics for understanding and analyzing data. In contrast, the median is the middle value of a dataset when it is ordered from smallest to largest and is not affected by outliers. The mode refers to the most frequently occurring value in a dataset and can exist in sets with no repetitions or multiple modes. The range defines the difference between the highest and lowest values in the dataset, offering insight into the spread of the data but not the central tendency. Thus, the definition and application of the mean make it the appropriate choice for describing the average value.

However, the entire sentence is part of a broader quotation that attributes the question to Shawna; therefore, it needs to maintain the clarity of both the question and the dialogue structure. In the response, the questioning part of the dialogue, "Was it Gwendolyn Brooks," is correctly enclosed within quotation marks, indicating that it is speech. However, an important aspect here is accurately punctuating the end of the question, which has been done properly by including a question mark before the closing quotation mark—signifying that the sentence is indeed a question. Additionally, attributing the dialogue using "Shawna asked" is correctly done to present who is speaking but requires a comma following the first quoted portion. The distinction between direct quotations and the speaker's attribution is essential to maintain the flow and clarity of the conversation. Therefore, the choice correctly addresses these grammatical and punctuation rules, leading to a well-formed sentence.

Therefore, changing "they're" to "their" correctly addresses the spelling error and enhances the clarity of the sentence.

Fragile X Syndrome is a genetic disorder associated with intellectual disability, while dyslexia is a specific learning disability affecting reading abilities, often linked to different cognitive processing rather than direct brain injury. Down Syndrome is a genetic condition caused by an extra chromosome, which can influence development but does not result from brain damage in the way that Cerebral Palsy does.

Thus, indicating that 4 years and older is when cooperative play is truly evident and well developed.

Consequently, the child's experience of social anxiety can create a cycle where the lack of peer interaction contributes to low self-esteem and increased anxiety, making it even harder to connect with others. By contrast, while learning to read and write, as well as managing behavior, can be influenced by an anxiety-withdrawal disorder, these areas are often more related to cognitive and motor development rather than direct social interaction. Hence, the impact on forming friendships stands out as the most significant challenge for a child facing anxiety and withdrawal.

This interactive approach fosters a love for language and promotes conversational skills as children respond to prompts, ask questions, and engage with both the storyteller and their peers. In contrast, multiple-choice reading assessments focus primarily on assessing knowledge rather than promoting language use. Independent book reports may not provide the necessary social interaction that is vital for developing oral language skills, particularly for young children who benefit from collaborative learning experiences. Group mathematics games, while valuable for building other skills, do not specifically target language development in the same way that interactive storytelling does. Thus, interactive storytelling is the most effective option for fostering oral language growth in preschool-aged children.
