Expedited delivery centers and priority processing locations may refer to general logistics operations rather than a specific customs arrangement, and Customs Fast Track facilities typically pertain more to the processing of pre-approved shipments rather than expressly allowing for payment for expedited handling at the point of entry.

This includes coordinating between different transportation modes (air, sea, truck) and managing logistics to ensure timely delivery. The role of an importer of record is often held by the entity that owns the goods being shipped, which can be separate from the Freight Forwarder. Similarly, while they may receive goods temporarily for consolidation or staging, this is not their primary role.
