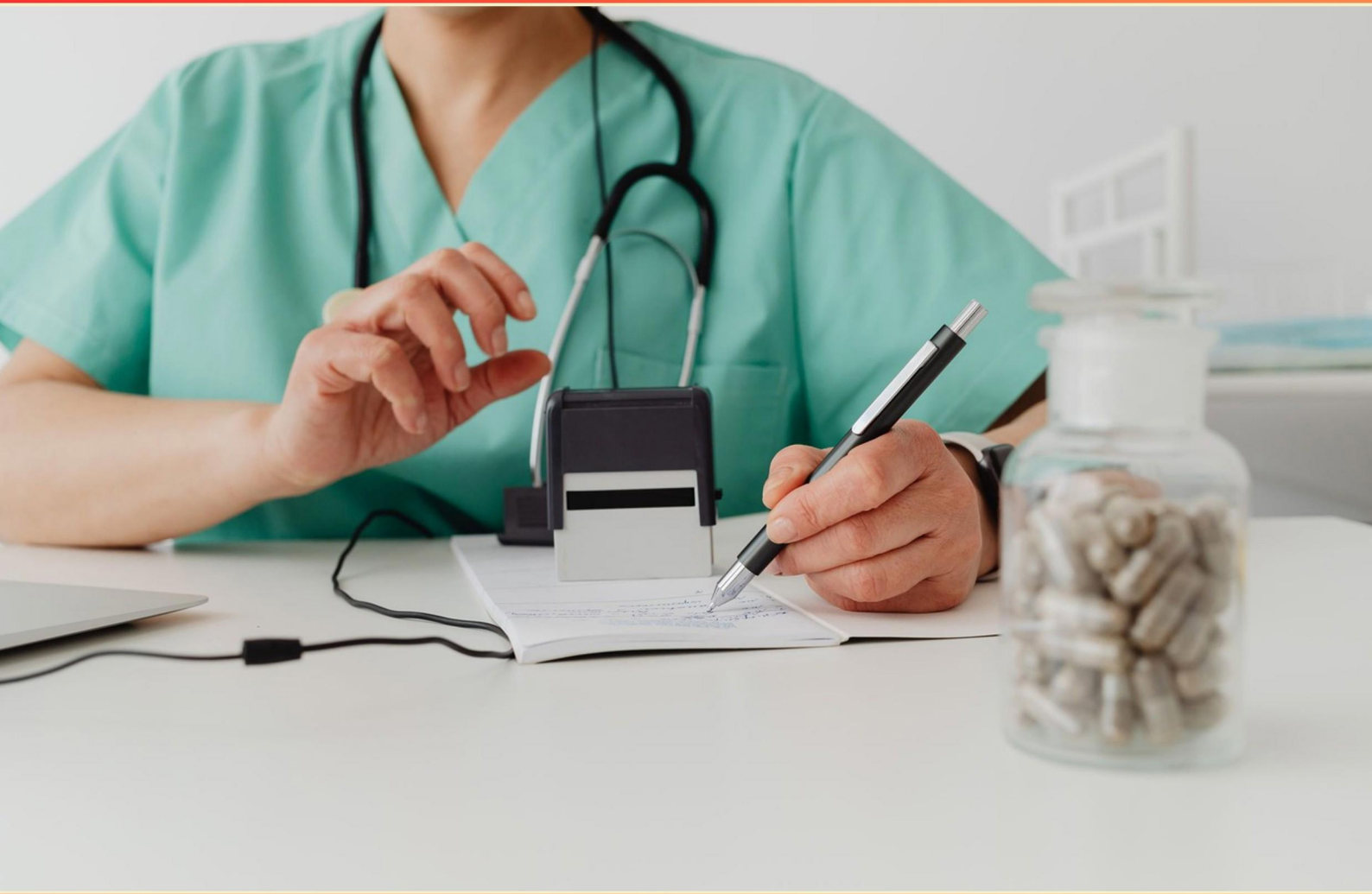

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Explanations

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1. Which medications are classified as analgesics?

Analgesics are medications specifically designed to relieve pain.
