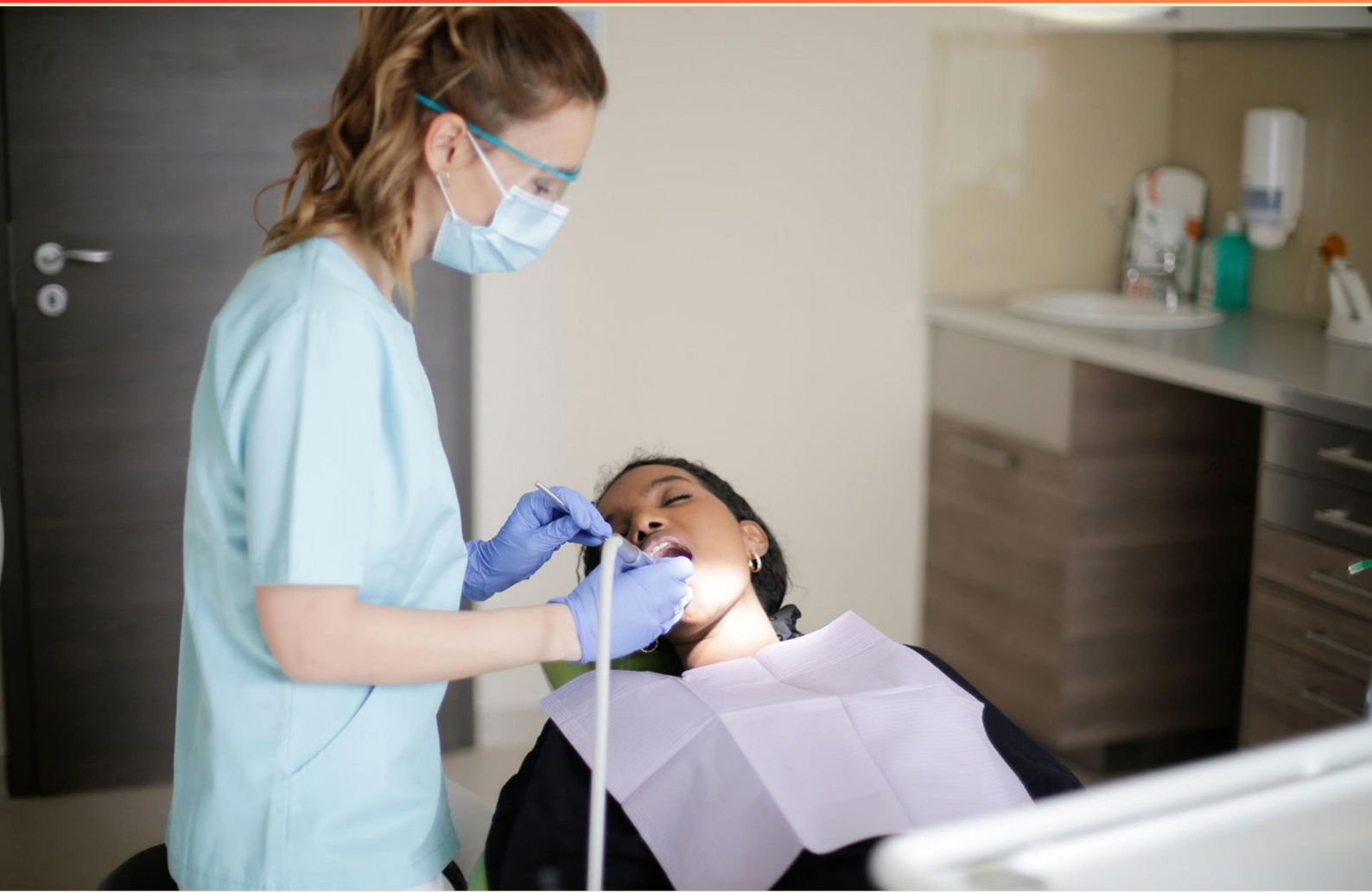

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Explanations

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1. Which of the following is not a root canal sealer used to seal unfilled voids?

Fluoride varnish is not a root canal sealer because its primary purpose is to provide a protective coating and deliver fluoride for the prevention of dental caries, rather than to seal unfilled voids in root canals.
