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## **Explanations**

Only after de-escalation attempts fail should a stun device be used as a controlled, last-resort measure. Pushing for immediate deployment or relying on force first contradicts best practices and policy guidelines.

De-escalation is the preferred approach when you have time to talk and there isn't an immediate risk of serious harm. When you can communicate calmly, give clear verbal commands, and create space or use non-threatening posture, you reduce tension and the likelihood of a situation escalating to violence. That way you address the situation without exposing yourself or others to the risks that come with deploying a device, while still keeping open the option to protect everyone if the situation escalates. If there's a serious threat or no time to talk, de-escalation becomes impractical and a rapid, forceful response may be necessary to prevent harm. Relying on a supervisor's order isn't about the safety decision in the moment, and a scenario with no chance to de-escalate clearly calls for immediate action rather than talking it down.

The main idea is that bizarre behavior seen in in-custody cases after taser exposure is most consistent with an acute stimulant-related mental state. When someone is delusional and agitated due to stimulant effects, their behavior can appear wildly incongruent and hard to control, which matches the described presentation. Descriptions involving depression or anxiety, sleepy or passive states, or purely confused or irritable moods do not capture the combination of delusional thinking and high agitation driven by stimulant use, so they're less explanatory of the observed behavior.

Electricity flows only when there is a complete path between the two probes. The subject forms that path when they are in contact with both probes, allowing current to flow through them. If others merely touch the subject and do not touch both probes (or bridge the circuit directly between the probes), there is no complete path for the current to reach them. That's why current won't pass to bystanders in contact with the subject unless they directly contact the probes or create a direct bridge between them. Therefore, the statement is correct: it will not pass to others unless there is direct contact between or on the probes.

That close-proximity requirement distinguishes it from other tools like pepper spray or a baton, which are designed to affect a target at a distance or through a strike. Pepper spray is a chemical irritant that can be deployed from several meters away, subject to wind and safety considerations for bystanders, while a baton relies on a physical impact that can be delivered with some range but still depends on reaching the target. So, the necessity of contact or near contact to deliver the electric pulse is the best description of how a stun device's deployment differs.

The electrical components of a TASER come into play after launch, delivering the high-voltage signal through the darts, not in the propulsion itself.

Keeping the team to a single backup reduces crowding and potential confusion, while still offering enough safety net to respond quickly if the situation shifts. Having no backup would leave less safety margin, and bringing in two or more backups isn't necessary once compliance is secured, as it can complicate the handcuffing process and increase crowding.

Trace evidence from the discharge is what ties a weapon to a scene. When a stun gun is fired, it can release identification tags—microtaggants or traceable residues embedded in the projectile or emitted with the discharge. These tags leave a chemical or physical signature at the location or on the target that investigators can test for and match back to a specific weapon or batch. That direct traceability is why this option is the best: it provides a concrete link between which gun was fired and where the discharge occurred, whereas timing alone, device memory, or surface marks don't uniquely identify the weapon or pinpoint the firing location.
