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Explanations

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1. Which statement best describes Grammar-Translation as an approach?

- A. It emphasizes communicative tasks.
- B. It emphasizes explicit grammar rules and translation exercises.**

Grammar-Translation centers on explicit grammar rules and translation exercises. It teaches grammar systematically, has students analyze and memorize rules, and apply them by translating sentences and texts between the target language and their native language. The main aim is accuracy in reading and writing, with vocabulary learned through lists and drills, while speaking and listening are given little emphasis. This is why the statement focusing on explicit grammar rules and translation exercises is the best fit. Other descriptions describe methods that prioritize communicative tasks, pronunciation, or spontaneous conversation, which aren't the hallmark of Grammar-Translation.

2. Which term is the result of combining words, typically with an apostrophe, to form a shorter unit?

Contractions form when two words are joined into a shorter form, with an apostrophe replacing the missing letters. This is exactly what you see in words like can't, it's, and you'd, where the letters from the original phrase (cannot, it is, you would) are omitted and represented by an apostrophe. Elision is a broader term that describes dropping sounds in speech and isn't limited to written forms, while ellipsis refers to omitting material and is shown with three dots. Fusion isn't the standard term used for this written shortening. So the correct term for combining words with an apostrophe to make a shorter unit is contraction.

3. Which term describes the process of joining the final consonant of one word to the initial vowel of the next word with no pause?

Catenation is the smooth joining of the final consonant of one word to the initial vowel of the next word, producing a seamless connection without a pause. This happens in fluent speech as speakers link words together, so you hear one continuous flow rather than distinct, separate words. For example, when saying something like "cat apple" quickly, the final /t/ from cat can connect directly into the vowel starting apple, creating a quick, continuous transition. This specific linking of a consonant to a following vowel is what catenation describes. The other terms describe different processes: elision is the omission of sounds, assimilation is when one sound becomes more like a neighboring sound, and affixation is adding prefixes or suffixes to a word. None of those capture the idea of linking a word boundary by a final consonant to the next word's initial vowel the way catenation does.

Replacing a full noun phrase with a shorter form like a pronoun is substitution. This is the exact move in discourse: a substitute word or form takes the place of the original noun phrase so we don't repeat it. Pronouns are the common substitutes that also point back to their antecedents, helping the text flow and stay connected. For example: The manager announced the change, and she explained it to the team. Here, she substitutes for "the manager" and it substitutes for "the change." Ellipsis would involve omitting material rather than substituting a shorter form, and reference is about connecting expressions to their antecedents, while substitution is the act of replacing the noun phrase itself. Grammatical cohesion is the broader idea that includes substitution along with these other devices.

Jazz chants are short, lively pieces—often a funny or memorable poem-like monologue or dialogue—that are designed to be spoken aloud with rhythm and beat. This approach builds oral fluency, pronunciation, and natural phrasing by having learners hear and produce language in chunks, using repetition and cadence. It's about practicing how language sounds when spoken, not just about memorizing grammar or reading silently, and not primarily a listening task. So the best description is a humorous, memorable text crafted for reading aloud and performing with others, which captures the rhythmic, spoken nature of jazz chants.

6. A test employing tasks which replicate real-life activities, such as writing a letter of complaint.

Direct testing is about assessing actual performance on tasks that mimic real-life language use. Writing a letter of complaint is an authentic, communicative task learners would need to perform outside the classroom, so it demonstrates how well someone can produce the language in a real context—organizing ideas, using appropriate tone, and applying conventional writing features. A multiple-choice test mainly checks recognition or recall rather than production of real text. A summary test focuses on condensing information, not on creating a new communicative piece. Portfolio assessment involves collecting work over time and can include authentic tasks, but the description points to a single task that replicates real-life use, which is the hallmark of direct testing.

7. In language teaching, practising language that learners have seen previously and recycling it in a different context is called what?

Recycling language is about taking expressions, vocabulary, or structures learners have already met and using them again in different contexts. This reinforces memory and helps learners see how language works across situations, not just in one fixed setting. For example, after learning how to ask for opinions in one topic, students might use the same phrases to discuss hobbies or future plans. The idea is to retrieve and apply what's known in new, varied contexts, which strengthens fluency and relevance. The other terms don't fit as well. Rehearsal usually refers to practicing a specific performance or dialogue, often within the same situation. Revision is more about editing or reviewing material to improve accuracy, not about applying it in new contexts. Retention is about remembering information over time, rather than the act of reusing language in new contexts.

8. What term describes self-correction by filling in a detail which should have occurred earlier in speech?

Self-correction by filling in a detail that should have appeared earlier in speech is repair. In conversation, speakers monitor what they say and when they realize something is missing or needs clarification, they insert the missing detail or rephrase to fix the utterance. This insertion of the omitted detail is the repair process, helping the message come across clearly. It's not about retracing the whole discourse (backtracking) or editing in writing (revisions), and echo-back isn't a standard term for this phenomenon. For example: "I lent Jamie my book last week—the travel guide I found in the library" shows the speaker repairing the sentence by adding the specific book to clarify which item was lent.

9. Which competence concerns expressing intentions clearly and appropriately to the interlocutor and situation?

Pragmatic competence is the ability to use language in a way that fits the social context and to convey one's intentions clearly to the listener. This includes choosing the right level of formality, tone, and indirectness, and tailoring speech to who you're talking to and the situation so your message is understood as intended. That's exactly what's being tested here: expressing intentions clearly and appropriately to the interlocutor and situation. Grammatical competence is about grammar rules and sentence structure, lexical competence is about having the right vocabulary, and fluency competence is about speaking smoothly and without hesitation. An example would be choosing a polite, indirect request in a formal setting versus a direct command with a friend; the content is similar, but the way you express it changes to suit the context—this kind of adaptation is the realm of pragmatic competence.

10. A conventional speech sound produced by articulatory movements that alter, interrupt, or obstruct the expired airstream is an example of which category?

A. Consonant

This describes how consonants are produced. Consonants arise when the airflow is constricted or even briefly blocked in the vocal tract by articulatory movements, altering or interrupting the airstream. Vowels, by contrast, use an open vocal tract with airflow that isn't obstructed, and their sound comes from voicing and resonance rather than constriction. So a conventional speech sound produced by changing the airflow with some obstruction fits the category of a consonant. (Fricatives are a type of consonant with a particular narrow constriction, but the statement refers to consonants in general.)
