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Explanations

Complete unconsciousness, being unresponsive, or exhibiting no reflexes indicate greater levels of sedation that could lead to airway compromise or an inability to respond to emergencies, which would not be appropriate in a dental context where minimal intervention is preferred. This highlights the importance of understanding sedation levels and their implications for patient safety and procedural effectiveness.
