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Explanations

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1. All teeth are missing in either the upper or lower arch is described as what?

A. Edentulous

B. Abutment

C. Implant

D. Curettage

The concept shown is edentulism. When all teeth are missing in one arch (upper or lower), that arch is described as edentulous. The term "edentulous" specifically means lacking natural teeth. If an entire patient has no teeth in both arches, they're completely edentulous. Abutment refers to a tooth or implant that supports a prosthesis, an implant is a root-form device used to anchor a prosthesis, and curettage is a surgical cleaning procedure for removing tissue from a tooth socket or pocket—none describe the absence of teeth.

2. A flexible silicone impression material known for accuracy and dimensional stability?

A. Crown

B. Alginate

C. Polyvinyl siloxane

Impression materials must capture fine details and stay the same size after setting. Flexible silicone elastomers do this very well, with high accuracy and excellent dimensional stability because they cure with addition reactions (no by-products) and have strong elastic recovery. Polyvinyl siloxane, a addition-cured silicone, is especially prized for these traits, giving true reproduction of tooth surfaces and margins even after removal and repeated pours. That combination of precise detail capture and minimal distortion is what makes it the preferred flexible silicone impression material for final impressions. The other options aren't impression materials: a crown is a tooth restoration, alginate is an easier-to-use preliminary impression material that is less dimensionally stable, and an impression tray is simply the container that holds the impression material.

In dental radiography, darker areas on the image indicate regions where X-rays pass through more easily, meaning those areas are less dense. The term used for these portions is radiolucent. Radiolucent areas appear darker because they attenuate fewer X-rays. In contrast, radiopacity describes areas that block more X-rays and thus appear lighter or whiter on the film. Opacity isn't the standard label for describing this characteristic in radiographs, and brightness refers to how the display shows the image rather than a property of the tissue itself. So, the best term for a region that allows more X-ray passage and looks darker is radiolucent.

Class I Malocclusion is when the bite is normal, but the teeth themselves are crooked, crowded, or rotated. The key idea is that jaw relationship (the bite) is okay, yet individual teeth are misaligned. That matches the description perfectly: a functioning bite with teeth that are not properly aligned. A general Malocclusion would suggest some bite or jaw problem beyond just crowding of teeth, which isn't implied here. Proper Occlusion would mean everything is aligned and functioning correctly, and an Open Bite describes a specific condition where the front teeth don't meet. So the best match is Class I Malocclusion.

5. What term describes the professional cleaning and polishing of teeth to prevent disease?

The term used for professional cleaning and polishing to prevent disease is prophylaxis. Prophylaxis refers to a preventive dental cleaning performed to remove plaque, calculus, and stains, followed by polishing to create a smooth surface that resists future buildup and supports gum health. It's focused on preventing disease rather than treating existing conditions. Scaling is often part of a prophylaxis, since it involves removing calculus, but the full preventive service is defined as prophylaxis. Asepsis relates to infection control, not the cleaning procedure itself, and "cleaning and polishing" is a descriptive phrase, whereas prophylaxis is the formal clinical term.

6. Pertaining to the lower jaw is described by which term?

The term used for the lower jaw is mandibular. This adjective comes from the mandible, the bone that forms the lower jaw and holds the lower teeth. It distinguishes from other dental terms: maxillary refers to the upper jaw, palatal describes the palate (the roof of the mouth), and alveolar relates to the alveolar ridge or sockets where teeth sit. In everyday dental language you'll see phrases like mandibular teeth or mandibular arch to specify structures on the lower jaw, reinforcing that mandibular specifically identifies the lower jaw region.

7. Which term is used to denote structures that appear darker on a radiograph?

On radiographs, darker areas are radiolucent. This happens when a structure is less dense and absorbs fewer X-rays, allowing more photons to pass through and leaving a darker shade on the image. The specific term for these dark regions is radiolucency, which describes the presence of less dense, more translucent tissue in the film or digital image. In contrast, structures that appear lighter are radiopaque because they absorb more X-rays. The word opacity isn't the standard dental term used to describe these dark areas, and luminosity isn't a clinical term in radiography. Examples of radiolucent features include a pulp chamber, caries, or certain lesions, which show up darker than surrounding dentition.

8. What type of anesthesia renders you unconscious and relieves pain across the body?

Unconsciousness with body-wide pain relief is achieved by general anesthesia. It depresses the brain and nervous system so you are not conscious, you don't feel pain, you don't remember the procedure, and your muscles are relaxed. This is different from local anesthesia, which only numbs a specific area and does not affect consciousness; sedation makes you sleepy but doesn't typically put you completely unconscious throughout the body; topical anesthesia numbs surfaces on the skin or mucous membranes. General anesthesia is used when the procedure requires you to be completely still and unaware, and it's given under careful monitoring with airway support.

9. Which term refers to pertaining to the gums?

In dental terminology, periodontal refers to the gums and the supporting tissues around the teeth. Because the question is about something pertaining to the gums, periodontal is the correct descriptor. The other terms describe different ideas: posterior means toward the back of the mouth, proximal refers to surfaces between adjacent teeth, and radiograph is an X-ray image. So periodontal is the best fit for anything related to the gums.

10. Which structure is composed of fibrous connective tissue and helps suspend a tooth in its socket?

A. Cementum

B. Pulp

C. Periodontal ligament

D. Alveolar bone

The periodontal ligament is the fibrous connective tissue that suspends a tooth in its socket. It stretches between the cementum on the tooth root and the surrounding alveolar bone, with collagen fibers—Sharpey's fibers—anchoring into both surfaces. This fibrous linkage absorbs and distributes chewing forces, helps keep the tooth stable, and provides sensory feedback. Cementum, while it serves as the attachment surface for these fibers, is mineralized tissue, not itself the suspensory connective tissue. The pulp is the tooth's soft inner tissue, and the alveolar bone forms the socket walls, but neither is the fibrous apparatus that suspends the tooth.
