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Explanations

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1. A judge who believes in deferring to the decisions of elected representatives believes in _____.

Judicial restraint is the approach where judges defer to the elected branches and limit their own intervention. A judge who believes in deferring to decisions of elected representatives is prioritizing accountability and the separation of powers, trusting that lawmakers answer to the people and should shape policy within constitutional bounds. This stance contrasts with judicial activism, which involves the judiciary actively shaping policy by overturning laws or expanding constitutional rights. The Attitudinal Model centers on a judge's own policy preferences guiding decisions, not on deference to the legislature, and originalism focuses on interpreting the Constitution as it was originally understood rather than on deferring to elected bodies.

Media polarization is driven by how digital platforms tailor content to individual users, which tends to push people toward like-minded sources. This creates filter bubbles—online spaces where exposure to opposing views is limited—and echo chambers where discussions reinforce already-held beliefs. As a result, individuals encounter more extreme positions within their own circles and fewer moderating perspectives, amplifying ideological divides. This dynamic makes cross-cutting exposure and balanced reporting rarer, and it can deepen distrust and reduce willingness to compromise in political discourse. In contrast, situations describing more balanced exposure or no change would not fit the typical effects of polarization driven by algorithmic curation.

Soft power is the ability to influence others through attraction and persuasion rather than coercion or payments. It flows from a country's culture, political values, and foreign policies that others find legitimate, appealing, or worthy of imitation. When people or other governments are drawn to your nation's way of life, ideas, or institutions—such as a vibrant culture, strong education system, respect for human rights, or trusted diplomatic practices—they may adopt your norms or support your policies without being forced to do so. This contrasts with hard power, which relies on military force or economic coercion, or with money-driven pressure like payments to sway decisions. Soft power is most effective when it generates voluntary alignment and trust, making others want to engage with or follow your lead.

Choosing a running mate is often about broadening the ticket to win over a large faction within the party. By selecting someone who strongly resonates with a significant constituency, the campaign signals that the ticket will represent that group's interests, helps unify the party, and broadens geographic or ideological appeal. A classic example is the Kennedy–Johnson pairing in 1960, which aimed to bring Southern Democrats into the fold and reduce regional tensions within the party. More recent campaigns have looked for reassurance to key voter blocks—such as blue-collar voters or long-time party loyalists—by appointing a veteran or differently credentialed running mate. This is why vp selection is typically about placating a major party constituency: it strengthens the coalition and improves the chances of winning. It's less about mentoring the president or pulling off primary opponents, and more about securing the broadest possible support within the party.

Malapportionment shows up when votes don't have equal weight because seats aren't tied to population. In the United States, the Senate gives every state two seats regardless of how many people live there. That means voters in small states have more influence per person than voters in large states, making this body especially prone to malapportionment. In contrast, the House is based on districts with roughly equal populations, so one person, one vote is the guiding idea there and malapportionment is not as acute. The other options don't describe a mechanism of representation tied to population in the same way, so they don't illustrate malapportionment as clearly.

In the Senate, counting votes and persuading members to support the party's position is the job of the majority whip. The whip acts as the liaison between the party leadership and rank-and-file members, tracking how senators are likely to vote and mobilizing support to secure the votes needed for legislation or floor action. This role is all about vote counting and party discipline, ensuring the leadership knows where the votes stand and pushing members to align with the party line. The other roles have different primary functions. The majority leader leads the party in the Senate and handles big-picture agenda and floor strategy, while the president pro tempore is mainly a ceremonial presiding officer. The Speaker leads the House, not the Senate, so those positions aren't focused on vote counting and persuasion within the Senate.

Uncertainty in polling comes from the fact that you're trying to infer the views of an entire population from a smaller group. Even with a well-designed sample, there are three main sources that can affect the results and push them away from the true population opinions. First, sampling error. The exact makeup of a random sample will never match the full population perfectly, so the numbers you see are a snapshot with some natural variation. This is what margins of error quantify: they tell you how much the estimate could plausibly differ if you could poll everyone. A larger sample reduces this uncertainty, but it never disappears entirely. Second, nonresponse. If certain people are less likely to respond, or if the people who do respond differ in their views from those who don't, the sample becomes biased. This distortion arises even if you sampled correctly, and pollsters try to correct for it with weighting and follow-ups, though some bias can still slip in. Third, social desirability bias. If respondents answer in a way they think is more socially acceptable rather than what they truly think, the results will skew. This is common on sensitive topics and can lead to systematic over- or underreporting of certain opinions. All together, these factors create a margin of error and the possibility that the reported numbers don't perfectly reflect the population's true opinions. The other options miss this idea: unreliable equipment isn't the main issue in public opinion polling, deliberate manipulation isn't about uncertainty the same way, and making questions easy doesn't address the core uncertainty that comes from sampling, response patterns, and social pressures.

When the president is popular, they gain political capital that translates into greater influence over policy. High approval signals to Congress and other leaders that the public supports the president's direction, making legislators more willing to back or refrain from opposing the president's proposals. This legitimacy helps the president set the agenda, frame issues, and use the bully pulpit to mobilize supporters, which in turn makes it easier to move initiatives through the legislative process. In short, higher ratings give the president leverage to achieve their policy goals. The other statements miss this core dynamic: popularity tends to expand, not restrict, the president's room to act; it doesn't automatically force Congress to oppose or support policies solely based on constituents' desires; and it doesn't guarantee a specific outcome like increased domestic spending, which depends on broader budget negotiations.

Legitimacy in government comes from the people's belief that the state has the right to rule. Elections provide that belief in a formal, public way by giving citizens the chance to choose their leaders and authorize the government to act on their behalf. They also create accountability, since leaders can be replaced through the ballot box, reinforcing a peaceful transfer of power. In contrast, a charismatic cult of personality relies on admiration for one individual and can be unstable; economic sanctions involve pressure from outside the state rather than built-in legitimacy; and military force is coercive power rather than a recognized mandate from the governed. So the practice of elections most reliably generates broad and legitimate authority.

When a vacancy in the vice presidency occurs, the president nominates a successor who then must be approved by a majority in both the Senate and the House. This process, codified by the 25th Amendment (Section 2) in 1967, ensures a legitimate and timely filling of the office without waiting for the next election. The Electoral College doesn't decide VP vacancies, and there isn't a national special election for the vice presidency; vacancies are filled through this presidential nomination and congressional confirmation.
