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Explanations

In contrast, other models such as the Community Emergency Response System focuses more broadly on community involvement and training, the National Response Framework provides a nationwide approach rather than a facility-specific one, and the Emergency Operations Center serves as a central command point for multi-agency coordination rather than an internal hospital management system. Therefore, HICS stands out as the appropriate model for disaster management specifically within a healthcare facility context.
