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Explanations

When comparing how an author handles adversity to another memoir, focus on three intertwined aspects: tone, strategy, and emphasis on systemic factors. Tone is about the attitude the author conveys toward hardship—whether they present it with hope, gravity, irony, or critique. Strategy looks at how adversity is presented—the narrative approach, structure, and what the author chooses to highlight (personal growth, decision-making, or broader actions). Emphasis on systemic factors considers how much the author situates adversity within larger social, political, or economic forces versus attributing it mainly to individual choices. The best answer recognizes both similarities and differences across all three dimensions: tone, strategy, and the role of systemic context. That breadth captures the full way two memoirs can approach adversity in comparable yet distinct ways. Why the other options don't fit: one option only mentions similarities in tone and differences in strategy, leaving out how systemic factors are emphasized. Another suggests the books share the same setting and plot devices, which isn't about how adversity is approached. The last option claims the memoir relies solely on personal anecdotes without systemic context, which ignores the comparative focus on how authors treat larger factors.

*The idea being tested is how a parent protects children by changing their environment. In *The Other Wes Moore*, the mother takes a bold step to keep her kids safe by relocating to a safer area. Moving alters daily surroundings, peer influences, and access to resources like safer streets and better schools, which directly reduces risk for the children. The emphasis in the story is on the act of moving itself as the protective measure, rather than just enrolling in a new school or other actions. While enrolling in a new school might occur as a result of moving, the move is the action that best encapsulates how she changed their situation to improve safety.*

3. What did Wes do in the car that made his mom angry?

The situation tests recognizing a moment of behavior that clearly disrupts a shared space. In this scene, Wes's mom gets angry because he starts rapping along to hip-hop in the car. That choice highlights his high energy and the tendency to be loud and animated when he's in a confined space, which can be annoying or disrespectful to a parent trying to have a calm ride or hold a conversation. The other actions don't fit the scenario as well: sleeping is quiet and not upsetting; arguing about chores isn't tied to the car moment; and the phrasing about spying a movie loud doesn't match a coherent described action. So the act of rapping along to hip-hop is what triggers the reaction.

A Pell Grant is a federal financial aid grant from the U.S. Department of Education that helps low income undergraduate students pay for college. It doesn't have to be repaid, unlike loans. It's specifically aimed at making college more affordable for students with demonstrated need, and it covers education-related costs such as tuition and fees, and sometimes living expenses. It's different from a tax credit, which reduces taxes owed, and from a work study program, which provides part time work to help pay for school.

Diversity within urban communities means recognizing that city life includes a wide range of experiences shaped by culture, language, immigration status, income, age, and neighborhood. The best answer captures this variety while also acknowledging that, despite differences, people face common challenges such as housing costs, access to quality schools and healthcare, safety, and employment opportunities. It also highlights resilience—the way residents adapt, form supportive networks, and organize to improve their neighborhoods. This view reflects both the richness of everyday life in cities and the shared pressures that communities work to overcome. Statements suggesting a single uniform experience, ignoring diversity, or claiming resilience is rare don't fit how urban life actually functions.

6. Why did Wes's mom decide to move to New York and live with her parents?

The main idea here is recognizing what motivates a character's decision to move. In this case, a concrete opportunity—the job offer in New York—drives the move. When a new job presents itself, relocating becomes a practical step to take advantage of that opportunity, and living with her parents provides a stable base during the transition as she starts this new role. The other reasons don't fit as the primary trigger: finishing school isn't described as the motive, being unable to handle it alone isn't the focus, and while living near relatives can be helpful, it's the job opportunity that sets the move in motion.

In this kind of question, the idol is the person whose example the narrator most strives to imitate and base choices on. Tony fills that role for the OWM because he represents a concrete, aspirational path—someone who models how to navigate challenges, pursue opportunities, and imagine a future beyond immediate surroundings. This influence shapes the OWM's decisions and fuels his motivation to strive for more. Mom provides essential love and support, but the figure who serves as the direct template for what the OWM wants to become is Tony. The other names don't function as the guiding example in the same way. That's why Tony is the best answer.

8. What sport was Wes participating in when he was looked at by college recruiters?

The moment being tested is identifying which sport drew college recruiters' attention to Wes. In the narrative, recruiters notice him while he's on the basketball court, which is the setting that prompts interest due to his on-court skills—speed, agility, court awareness, and teamwork. This scene highlights how a player's performance in a fast-paced team sport can attract college attention, making basketball the sport described. So the best choice is basketball.

9. What did the mayor suggest to Wes during their meeting?

The key idea here is recognizing why a leader would point a talented student toward a life-changing, globally oriented opportunity. Suggesting a Rhodes Scholarship shows the mayor believes in Wes's leadership, academics, and service—traits that elite programs look for—and wants to give him a path that can dramatically expand his chances, not just regionally but internationally. A Rhodes Scholarship would fund study at Oxford, provide rigorous intellectual challenge, and connect Wes to a network that can shape his future for years to come. That's why this suggestion stands out: it's about investing in a prestigious, transformative route that aligns with Wes's potential and can open doors far beyond his current environment. The other options don't fit as well because they point to different directions—military service, a general idea of studying abroad, or starting a business—whereas the Rhodes path encapsulates elite academics, leadership development, and global opportunity in one clear plan.

Job Corps is a federal program that provides free education and vocational training to young people who need help getting started in work. It primarily serves youths around 16 to 24 years old who come from economically disadvantaged backgrounds, helping them gain skills, training, and placement into careers. Because of this focus on teaching and preparing young people who are in need, the best description among the options is an organization that trains poor kids. It isn't a conservation camp, it isn't aimed at adults for government jobs, and it isn't a private tutoring service.
