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Explanations

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1. When the confirmation test result is printed directly on the ATF, tamper-evident tape is not required.

A. Attach tamper-evident tape in all cases.

B. No tamper-evident tape is required if printed directly on the ATF.

C. Tamper-evident tape is required only if the EBT prints on the ATF.

D. The result must be stored electronically.

The main idea here is how to protect the integrity of the confirmation test result depending on how it is produced. If the confirmation test result is printed directly on the Alcohol Test Form (ATF), there is no separate printout that could be swapped or altered, so tamper-evident tape isn't needed. The result is already part of the official record on the ATF itself, and sealing isn't necessary to guard against tampering. If the confirmation result comes from a separate printout (for example, printed by a device other than directly on the ATF), tamper-evident tape is used to seal that printout to the ATF to show if anyone tried to replace the result or alter it. So, printing directly on the ATF eliminates the need for tamper-evident tape, whereas a separate printout would require it. The other options don't match this specific condition.

2. After the BAT has instructed the employee regarding the deprivation period between a positive screening and confirmation test, what should the BAT do if the employee belches?

Belching during the 15-minute deprivation period is a documented event you should record, and you still proceed with the confirmation test after that waiting period. The 15-minute wait exists to reduce the chance that residual mouth alcohol skews the confirmation result, so belching doesn't automatically reset or cancel the process—you just note what happened in the remarks on the ATF and then complete the confirmation test once the wait is over. Canceling the test or pausing longer than specified isn't warranted, and ignoring the belch wouldn't meet testing procedures.

3. Which type(s) of tests can non-evidential screening devices be used for?

Non-evidential screening devices are meant to quickly indicate whether alcohol is likely present without providing a legally admissible result. In DOT testing, they're used for screening tests to decide if a follow-up confirmatory test with an evidential breath testing device is needed. They aren't suitable for confirmation tests, and they aren't the basis for enforceable results in post-incident or random scenarios. So, their proper use is for DOT screening tests.

4. Which detection principle is used by EBTs to convert breath ethanol levels into an electrical signal proportional to concentration?

The principle being tested is how a breath alcohol tester turns the chemical signal of ethanol in breath into an electrical signal you read as a concentration. In evidential breath testing devices, the sensing element is a fuel cell or electrochemical sensor. Ethanol from the breath is oxidized at the sensor's electrode, which releases electrons and creates an electrical current. The size of that current is proportional to how much ethanol is present, and the instrument converts that current into a readable concentration value. This approach is ideal for handheld devices because it's simple, compact, fast, and cost-effective, while giving a direct electrical output that can be accurately scaled to breath alcohol concentration. Infrared spectrometry, while accurate for some applications, requires bulkier, more expensive optics and precise alignment, making it less suitable for portable breath testers. Gas chromatography and mass spectrometry are highly accurate lab methods that separate and identify compounds or measure their masses; they are powerful but too complex and slow for everyday field or evidential testing, so they're not the detection principle used in typical EBTs.

QA plans for EBTs are the set of procedures that establish how the device should be calibrated, tested, and maintained to ensure accurate results. The manufacturer prepares this plan because it is built from the device's specific design and components, detailing the exact steps, limits, and actions needed to verify performance. When the plan comes from the maker, you have a consistent, device-specific reference that matches how the instrument was intended to operate, which helps ensure the results you read are trustworthy. Following the manufacturer's QA plan is essential for proper calibration and verification; it defines what constitutes acceptable performance and when recalibration or maintenance is required. If the plan weren't provided by the maker, calibration procedures could vary and jeopardize accuracy. The other statements aren't correct because QA plans aren't optional, and they do directly influence calibration by prescribing the procedures and acceptance criteria that must be followed.

6. Which description best matches where alcohol testing records should be stored?

Alcohol testing records contain sensitive employee information and must be protected from unauthorized access and tampering. Storing them in a location with controlled access ensures only authorized personnel can view or modify the records, and it supports proper retrieval, confidentiality, and accountability. An access-controlled cabinet or a password-protected electronic system with audit trails meets these needs and aligns with confidentiality and compliance requirements. In contrast, a public shelf, broad-access shared drives, or a personal USB drive increase the risk of disclosure, loss, or changes and fail to provide reliable control or traceability. Keeping records securely with restricted access is the best practice.

7. When the BAT runs out of mouthpieces prior to a scheduled DOT alcohol test, what type of test is this considered?

- A. Uncompleted**

If the collection can't be completed because the necessary mouthpieces aren't available, the test is considered uncompleted. This isn't a cancellation or a refusal—no one is refusing to test, and the process isn't halted by a decision to cancel. It's simply that the equipment needed to finish the test is missing, so the testing process cannot be finished. When mouthpieces are available again, the test can be started or resumed, and the situation is documented so the status reflects that the test was not completed due to the equipment issue.

8. True or False: It is important that all records are kept in a confidential manner.

Keeping records confidential is essential because breath-test records contain sensitive personal information and test results. Protecting this information helps maintain employee privacy, reduces the risk of misuse, and is required by DOT regulations governing drug and alcohol testing. Access should be limited to individuals with a legitimate need to know, such as the employer's safety personnel, the Medical Review Officer, and other parties specifically authorized by law. Records must be stored securely and retained according to the mandated retention rules. Because sharing or exposing this information without proper authorization can violate privacy protections and DOT rules, confidentiality is necessary for every record.

9. Which record type has a retention period of 5 years?

Record-keeping timelines for DOT alcohol testing are set so that more serious or potentially contentious results stay on file longer. The category that has a five-year retention is the set of records showing an alcohol test result at or above the 0.020 level. Keeping these results for five years creates a reliable audit trail in case of investigations, disputes, or regulatory reviews over time. Other records—like results that show no detectable or very low alcohol, tests that were cancelled, and training records—aren't kept for five years. They serve different purposes (verifying a test occurred, showing the test was invalid, or proving training completion) and are retained for shorter periods appropriate to those functions.

10. True or False? The BAT copy of the ATF must be kept for at least 90 days.

Retention of alcohol test records under DOT regulations is the key idea. Under 49 CFR Part 40, employers must retain all documentation related to an alcohol test for five years from the test date. This includes the BAT's copy of the Alcohol Testing Form. Keeping it for only 90 days would not meet the regulatory requirement, because the records need to be available for audits, investigations, and MRO review for the full five-year period.
