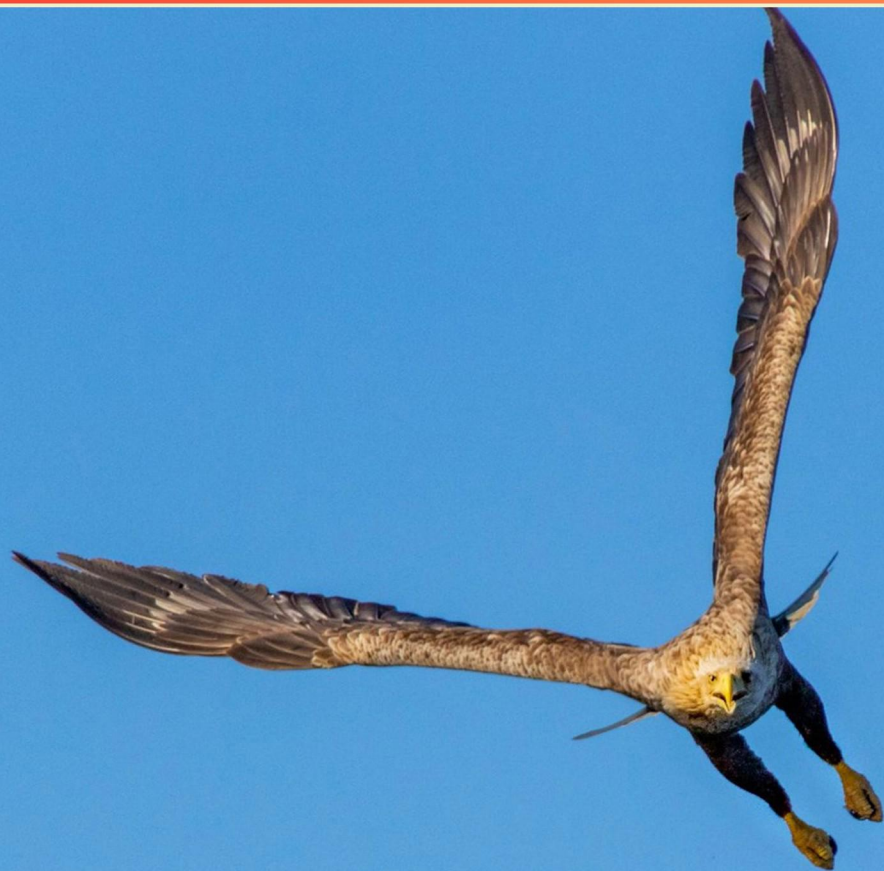

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Explanations

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1. If a line rises 2 units for every 1 unit to the right, what is the slope?

- A. $1/2$
- B. $4/3$
- C. $3/2$
- D. 2**

Slope is the ratio of rise to run. If the line rises 2 units for every 1 unit to the right, the slope is rise over run = $2/1 = 2$. This matches a steep upward line. The other values would require different rise-to-run amounts, so they don't fit the given pattern.

2. A table shows the number of books read per month by two students. If Student A read 6, 7, 8 and Student B read 3, 5, 7, which student had the higher average?

- A. Student B
- B. Student A**
- C. Not determinable
- D. Both equal

The average is found by adding all values and dividing by how many values you have. Here, each student has three numbers, so you can compute the mean for each. For the first student: $6 + 7 + 8 = 21$, and $21 \div 3 = 7$. For the second student: $3 + 5 + 7 = 15$, and $15 \div 3 = 5$. Since 7 is greater than 5, the first student has the higher average. Also, every month for the first student is higher than the corresponding month for the second, which aligns with the higher mean.

3. Which Yah/Nah term corresponds to 'Eagle Connection'?

- A. Eagle Connections
- B. Eagle Link

The key idea here is exact lexical matching: the Yah/Nah term should mirror the English phrase in form and meaning. For the English phrase Eagle Connection, the exact singular term Eagle Connection fits best. It preserves both the number (singular) and the intended meaning of a single connection. The other options change the sense: Eagle Connections implies multiple connections, Eagle Link uses a different noun that shifts the nuance to a link rather than a connection, and Eagle Network describes a broader system rather than a single connection. So the singular Eagle Connection is the most accurate match.

4. If a line has slope 4 and passes through (0, -2), what is its equation in slope-intercept form?

A. $y = 4x - 2$

B. $y = 4x + 2$

C. $y = -4x - 2$

D. $y = x - 2$

In slope-intercept form, a line is written as $y = mx + b$, where m is the slope and b is the y-intercept. Here, the slope is 4, so start with $y = 4x + b$. The line passes through (0, -2), and when $x = 0$, $y = -2$, which means $-2 = 4(0) + b$, so $b = -2$. Therefore, the equation is $y = 4x - 2$. If you tried a different intercept or slope, the line wouldn't pass through the given point, so this form satisfies both the slope and the point.

5. The Guld park campus location is in which city?

A. Biloxi, MS

B. Long Beach, MS

C. Gulfport, MS

D. Hattiesburg, MS

The Gulf Park Campus is the coastal branch of the university located in Long Beach, Mississippi. It sits along the Gulf Coast near Biloxi and Gulfport, but the campus's official location is Long Beach, which is why that choice is correct. The inland city of Hattiesburg hosts the main campus, so it isn't the Gulf Park location. Gulfport and Biloxi are nearby options, but they are not where the Gulf Park Campus is.

6. What is the Yah/Nah word for 'Eagle Connection'?

A. Eagle Connections

B. Eagle Connection

C. Eagle Link

D. Eagle Network

This question is testing how the Yah/Nah term for a concept that represents a network or system is formed. In this context, the concept of an "Eagle Connection" is treated as a collective idea rather than a single instance, so the plural form best conveys the broader sense of a network or set of connections. Eagle Connections is the best choice because it matches that plural, category-wide sense and aligns with how such concepts are often named in Yah/Nah. The singular Eagle Connection would imply just one link, which doesn't capture the broader idea. Eagle Link and Eagle Network use different words that aren't the exact Yah/Nah term for this concept, so they aren't the correct translation choice here.

7. Which feature near the front of campus is the name of a lake donated in 1933?

- A. Lake Byron**
- B. All American Rose Garden
- C. Lofty Returns
- D. Southern Station

This question tests recognizing a named water feature and its donor history. The clue is the word Lake, which indicates a body of water. Among the options, only Lake Byron is actually a lake. It matches the description of a lake donated in 1933 and located near the front of campus. The other choices refer to a garden (All American Rose Garden) or other features not lakes, so they don't fit the clue about a lake donation.

8. In a central idea question, how do details function?

- A. They distract from the main point
- B. They support the central idea with evidence**
- C. They are irrelevant
- D. They describe background only

Details in a central idea passage act as evidence and illustration that back up the main point. They ground the central idea in specifics, helping the reader see why the claim is true and how it applies. The right choice captures this role exactly: details support the central idea with evidence. They provide data, examples, and explanations that prove or clarify the main message, making it more convincing and understandable. For example, if the central idea is that "regular breaks boost productivity," the details might include a study showing increased focus after short breaks, a description of how breaks reduce fatigue, and practical tips for scheduling them. These particulars reinforce the main point rather than merely restating it. Details that distract from the main point, are irrelevant, or describe background only do not serve this purpose as effectively. They may be present, but their primary function is to reinforce the central idea with concrete support.

9. Which punctuation mark should be used to introduce a list after a complete sentence?

- A. semicolon
- B. period
- C. comma
- D. colon**

When you want to introduce a list after a complete sentence, use a colon. The colon signals that what follows explains, clarifies, or enumerates the idea that came before. It acts as a lead-in to the list, making the relationship between the sentence and the items clear. For example: You will need three things for this project: scissors, tape, and paper. The items follow the colon and complete the setup of the sentence. A semicolon is used to link related independent clauses or to separate items in a complex list, not to introduce the list itself. A period ends the sentence, so it wouldn't lead into the list. A comma wouldn't properly announce a list after a complete sentence and could create confusion.

10. In Yah/Nah terms, what is the Gym typically referred to as?

- A. Gym
- B. Residence Hall
- C. Recreation / Workout facility
- D. Dinning Hall

In Yah/Nah terminology, spaces are named by their function rather than using a borrowed label. A place dedicated to physical activity is described as a recreation / workout facility because that name covers both casual recreation and structured exercise, reflecting the space's purpose more accurately than a simple label like "gym." The other options refer to entirely different functions—dining hall for meals, residence hall for housing—so they don't describe the purpose of the space. Describing it as a recreation / workout facility also aligns with a broader, function-based naming approach rather than a single English nickname.
