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Explanations

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1. Which amendment grants citizenship rights to everyone born in the United States and guarantees equal protection of laws?

Birthright citizenship and equal protection under the law are guaranteed by the Fourteenth Amendment. It establishes that anyone born in the United States is a citizen and therefore entitled to the privileges and protections of citizenship, while also prohibiting states from denying people equal protection of the laws. The amendment also includes the Due Process Clause, which protects individuals from state actions that would deprive them of life, liberty, or property without fair procedures. The other amendments address different issues—voting rights regardless of race, taxation authority, and the abolition of slavery—so they do not specifically define citizenship or establish broad equal protection in the way the Fourteenth does.

This reflected a shift in Cold War strategy to guard critical oil resources and prevent Soviet influence from spreading into a volatile region after events like the Suez Crisis. Think of how this differs from broader but older efforts: the Truman Doctrine focused on preventing communism from taking hold in Europe, especially Greece and Turkey, and the Marshall Plan focused on rebuilding Western Europe after World War II. Containment, meanwhile, is the overarching strategy of keeping communism from expanding, not a single policy aimed at the Middle East. The Eisenhower Doctrine is the specific regional application of that containment idea, defining a clear commitment to aid and potential intervention in the Middle East when faced with communist threats.

Douglas MacArthur served as the commander of UN forces in Korea, holding the role of Supreme Commander for the United Nations Command. When North Korea invaded South Korea in 1950, his leadership guided the early response: he helped organize the defense at the Pusan Perimeter and then crafted the bold Inchon landing, which outflanked the North Koreans, recaptured Seoul, and allowed UN forces to reverse the invasion. This sequence—stubborn defense followed by a decisive counteroffensive—defines why he is remembered as the leader who repelled the North Korean invasion. He remained the top commander until 1951, when he was relieved by President Truman over strategic disagreements. The other figures were prominent in other contexts (World War II or different roles) and did not lead UN forces in Korea.

The scale of the Interstate system when it was established was set by law at about 41,000 miles. SNCC organized the famous Greensboro sit-ins and spurred similar actions across the South, uniting students from colleges with broader civil rights networks and applying nonviolence as its core tactic. This emphasis on student-led direct action and collaboration with CORE makes SNCC the best fit. The other groups played crucial roles in different aspects of the movement: the NAACP focused more on legal strategies and court challenges; the SCLC organized large-scale, church-based nonviolent protests led by veteran leaders like MLK; CORE pioneered nonviolent direct action, including early sit-ins, but SNCC is the one most closely associated with leading student-driven sit-in campaigns and sustaining nonviolent protest across multiple campaigns in the 1960s.

It also made employment discrimination illegal under Title VII, which bans unfair treatment in hiring, firing, and other terms of work based on race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. This combination—ending segregation in public spaces, supporting school desegregation, and making employment discrimination illegal—matches what this act accomplished. The other acts address different issues. The Voting Rights Act of 1965 targeted barriers to voting. The Civil Rights Act of 1968 focused primarily on housing discrimination and added protections in that area. The Equal Employment Opportunity Act of 1972 expanded and strengthened the enforcement of Title VII but did not cover the broad range of public accommodations and school integration that the 1964 act did.

The idea isn't just about military might; it describes a network where industry profits, political support, and strategic planning reinforce each other, shaping security policy and budgets. This concept is a fit because it names the specific relationship among those three pillars, unlike the other options. The Domestic Welfare State refers to social programs for citizens, the Truman Doctrine was about containing communism through overseas commitments, and Deterrence Theory is a strategic idea about preventing attack through the threat of retaliation—not a description of a concrete alliance between military, industry, and government.

The other events were crucial in their own rights—urban unrest, sustained protest, and voting rights advocacy—but they aren't remembered for a single, widely celebrated speech that symbolized the movement in the same way.
