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Explanations

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1. Unexplained bruises, lack of reaction to pain, and fear of going home could indicate

- A. Neglect
- B. Emotional Abuse
- C. Sexual Abuse
- D. Physical Abuse**

Unexplained bruises, a reduced or absent reaction to pain, and fear of going home point to physical harm from a caregiver. Unexplained injuries suggest a cause other than an accidental mishap, and a child who doesn't respond to pain in the usual way can indicate they've become desensitized or frightened by ongoing mistreatment. The fear of returning home especially signals that the home environment itself may be unsafe, which is a hallmark of physical abuse. While neglect, emotional abuse, or sexual abuse can involve serious harm, this specific combination of injury without a clear explanation, muted pain response, and fear tied to the home most strongly aligns with physical abuse. If you notice these signs, it's important to report them to the appropriate authorities so the child can be protected.

Failing to provide basic necessities like food, shelter, and clothing shows a caregiver not meeting a child's essential physical needs. That lack of basic care is the definition of neglect, specifically the form that centers on not providing for a child's basic welfare. It isn't about medical care, which would be medical neglect; it isn't about leaving a child with no caregiver, which would be abandonment; and while neglect can involve harm to the body, the term that best captures the act here is neglect itself. So this situation is neglect.

When you suspect child maltreatment, the priority is the child's safety and following the proper reporting process. Do not investigate on your own. Handling it privately can delay protection, lead to misinterpretation of signs, and risk contaminating evidence or breaching confidentiality. Trained authorities and your institution's policies are in place to assess risk, preserve information, and connect the child with needed services. Reporting to the appropriate authorities and documenting concerns while following policy are the appropriate steps, and informing the campus principal is part of the internal process when required. The action that should be avoided is trying to investigate the situation yourself instead of making a proper report.

4. What does 'unsubstantiated' mean in maltreatment determinations?

The main idea here is how maltreatment determinations are described after an investigation. When a case is investigated, the agency decides whether there is enough credible evidence to prove that maltreatment occurred. If there is enough evidence to support the claim, the finding is that maltreatment happened. If there isn't enough credible evidence to prove the claim, the finding is unsubstantiated, meaning the allegation isn't proven. So, unsubstantiated means not proven. It does not say the report was false, nor that the investigation is ongoing, nor that maltreatment happened. Those would be different outcomes.

Neglect centers on failing to meet a child's basic needs, including ongoing supervision and access to education. Truancy directly signals that gap by showing a child is not regularly attending school, which reflects a caregiver's failure to ensure proper supervision and educational care. That direct link to neglect makes it the most characteristic sign among the options. The other signs—unexplained injuries, welts, and burns—are more commonly associated with physical abuse (or unsafe conditions), though abuse can occur alongside neglect, these injuries don't define neglect as clearly as missing school does.

Reasonable suspicion means that, based on what you know and what you have observed, a reasonable person with relevant knowledge would suspect that maltreatment may be occurring. It's a threshold used to decide whether to report to the designated child protective agency. It does not require proof beyond a doubt or definite confirmation, and it's not just a rumor with no evidence. If there are observations or information that would lead a reasonable person to believe maltreatment might be happening, that's enough to trigger a report.

7. Which is a common physical sign of physical abuse in a child?

Unexplained injuries are a common red flag for physical abuse because injuries that cannot be tied to a plausible accident or explained by the child's activities suggest someone else may be harming the child. In real life, abuse often shows up as bruises, burns, or other harm in places or at times that don't match what the child reports or what's expected for their age and activities. When injuries don't fit a believable scenario or appear in different stages of healing without a clear cause, it raises concern and prompts further assessment and reporting. By contrast, explanations that reasonable align with common accidents or normal childhood play are less suggestive of abuse, and simply having no injuries at all does not rule out abuse but is not itself a common sign.

8. Indecent exposure is categorized as which type of abuse?

Indecent exposure is categorized as sexual abuse. The act involves exposing sexual organs or engaging in sexual behavior toward another person without consent, which violates a person's sexual boundaries. Even without physical contact, this kind of exposure targets sexual integrity and can cause fear, distress, or trauma, especially in children or vulnerable individuals. It isn't physical abuse, since there isn't necessarily bodily injury or harm being inflicted. It isn't neglect, which involves failing to meet basic needs, nor emotional abuse, which centers on harming someone's feelings or self-worth without a sexual component. So the category that fits best is sexual abuse.

When a child may be maltreated, safety comes first, so you report as soon as you have reasonable suspicion. You don't need to wait for proof or full evidence to make the call. The reporting obligation is about initiating protection and assessment right away. Reports are confidential to protect the child and the reporter, but information is shared with the designated child protective agency and, when needed, other relevant agencies to carry out a proper investigation and ensure the child's safety. You don't delay because an investigation hasn't started yet; reporting should occur promptly so investigators can assess risk and respond. Delaying until evidence is obtained or waiting until an investigation has begun aren't appropriate because the purpose of reporting is early identification and intervention to keep the child safe, not to prove maltreatment before speaking up.

Neglect is the form of maltreatment that involves failing to meet a child's basic needs, including medical care and hygiene. When caregivers don't arrange necessary medical evaluation or treatment and don't ensure regular hygiene, clean environments, and adequate care, the child's health and development suffer. That lack of proper medical care and poor hygiene are classic indicators of neglect. Other forms—emotional abuse targets the child's feelings and psychological well-being; sexual abuse involves inappropriate sexual contact or exploitation; human trafficking involves coercion for labor or sex. The scenario described centers on the caregiver's failure to provide essential care and cleanliness, which is neglect.
