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Explanations

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1. Which of the following was NOT a long-term cause of the Armada?

- A. Elizabeth I refused Phillip II's marriage offer.

The question is about long-term motives behind Philip II's decision to assemble the Armada. The driving forces were religious and political: a Catholic claimant against English Protestant rule, anger over England's support for Dutch rebels, and the desire to strike back after Mary Queen of Scots was executed. These are enduring, strategic grievances that shaped Philip II's worldview and policy over many years. The discovery of new trade routes by English merchants in the Atlantic, while important for England's economic and maritime rise, isn't a direct motive for launching the Armada. It represents broader economic expansion rather than a political or religious incentive that would push Philip II to invade. It helped England become a stronger maritime power, which in turn made invasion more appealing to Spain as a way to curb English influence, but it is not itself a long-term cause of the Armada.

Progress in Elizabethan terms is the monarch's royal journey around England, where the ruler and a large court traveled from place to place and stayed overnight in noble houses along the route. The hosts would provide lodging, food, and entertainment for the Crown at no charge to the monarchy. This practice was a way to display royal authority and magnificence, connect with important nobles, and see how different regions were being governed. It also gave the queen a chance to hear petitions, observe local conditions, and reinforce loyalty across the realm. It isn't a religious pilgrimage, a tax-collection method, or a ceremonial choir procession—it's about the traveling court and the social and political bonds it maintained.

In Elizabethan fashion, pale skin was highly prized and used as a sign of wealth and status, so people wore heavy makeup to whiten their complexions. The material that achieved the thick, opaque white look most effectively was a lead-based cosmetic, historically known as white lead or ceruse. It was mixed into a paste and applied in generous layers across the face, producing that stark, chalky whiteness that was fashionable at the time. While it created the desired effect, it was also extremely toxic and could cause serious skin damage and health problems. The other items listed are garments, not cosmetics: a ruff is the large, starched collar; a doublet is a fitted jacket; a farthingale is the hoop-skirt designed to widen the hips.

This question tests knowledge of Elizabethan theatre audiences. Groundlings were the people who stood in the pit, the yard in front of the stage, during performances. They paid a small price to stand and watch, staying close to the action as the actors performed on a stage that projected into that crowded open space. Wealthier spectators could sit in the galleries higher up, but the groundlings formed the lively, standing crowd right around the stage. This arrangement helps explain the term itself and why these audiences were known for their vocal, interactive presence during plays.

5. Which individuals were shareholders in The Globe Theatre?

The question tests who actually owned shares in The Globe Theatre, focusing on the people who financed and held equity in the venture. The Globe was built and financed by the Burbage brothers, Richard and Cuthbert, who were central figures in the acting company and in bringing the theatre to life. Their role as builders and major investors means they held the official shares that defined ownership of The Globe. Other famous members of the acting company, like Shakespeare and others, were closely associated with the troupe and performed there, but the pair identified as shareholders for this landmark venture are the Burbage brothers.

The area with the strongest Catholic presence after the Reformation is tied to regional patterns of religion and how communities held onto their Catholic identity. In the north-west, rural communities and powerful local Catholic gentry kept faith traditions living even as the Crown imposed the Anglican settlement. Private chapels, recusant networks, and families who remained Catholic helped sustain a larger share of adherents there, reinforced by geographic distance from the center of political and religious authority and links to Ireland and Scotland. This combination made Catholic worship and loyalty more durable in the north-west than in other parts of the country. By contrast, the south-east around the capital was where the Anglican church was most firmly established and enforced, the Midlands showed a mixed picture with substantial Protestant influence, and the south-west, while it had Catholic pockets, did not maintain a majority.

The key idea is that welfare relief was organized at the local parish level. The Poor Rate was a parish tax raised to help the needy, and the responsibility for collecting it and actually handing out the aid lay with parish officials, especially the overseers of the poor chosen by the parish vestry. These officers administered relief directly to the poor—money, clothing, or help with work or apprenticeships—under local church and magistrate oversight. Central authorities like the king, church bishops, or merchants did not run the distribution; the system was designed around local, parish-based administration of welfare.

The main idea here is where Spanish military efforts under Parma were focused during the Dutch Revolt. Parma, a leading Spanish general sent by Philip II, was stationed in the Low Countries to restore Catholic authority and suppress the Protestant rebels fighting against foreign (Spanish) occupation. He commanded the Army of Flanders there, conducting sieges and campaigns across the Netherlands to reassert control. This is why the correct description spots him in the Netherlands, engaged against the Protestant revolt. He wasn't operating from England as a royal fleet commander, nor guarding Mediterranean trade routes, which were roles tied to other theaters and leaders.

Alms are charity given to the poor, typically money or goods, as an act of religious duty in Elizabethan society. Giving alms reflected the belief that helping those in need was a moral obligation and a way to express piety; parishes, churches, and charitable institutions often collected or distributed alms to support the needy. The other terms refer to unrelated ideas: enclosing land into hedged fields, a severe shortage of food, and a royal license granting a company the right to sell.

Elizabeth's wit shaped how she interacted with suitors and courtiers, often using playful or pointed nicknames to manage negotiations and impressions at court. The French prince Francis, who held the titles Duke of Alençon and later Duke of Anjou, was a prominent late-Elizabethan suitor, and accounts note that she referred to him as "the frog." This nickname reflects the way she teased foreign nobles while navigating delicate marriage negotiations that carried immense political weight for England. The other options don't fit because they describe roles or relationships that aren't about a specific person given that nickname—Elizabeth's public persona as the so-called Virgin Queen, or a court dancer or her nonexistent husband—whereas the frog epithet is tied to the Duke of Alençon.
