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Explanations

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1. How much activated charcoal should you administer to a 42-year-old patient weighing 154 pounds?

Activated charcoal is commonly used in emergency medicine for the treatment of certain types of poisoning or overdose. The general guideline for administering activated charcoal in adults is to use a dose of 1 gram per kilogram of body weight. To determine the correct dosage for a patient weighing 154 pounds, you first need to convert that weight into kilograms. There are approximately 2.2 pounds in a kilogram, so dividing 154 pounds by 2.2 gives you about 70 kilograms. Thus, monitoring for signs and symptoms indicative of esophageal injury is vital in the management of patients who have ingested corrosive substances.
