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Explanations

Robbery requires the use of force, intimidation, or threat to take property from someone directly, which again does not apply as the theft of the radio occurred without any confrontation. Assault involves causing physical harm or the threat of harm to another person, which is unrelated to the act of stealing an object from a location. Therefore, theft is the most accurate description of the offense committed in this situation.
