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Explanations

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1. What is a primary source? Give an example.

A primary source is an original, firsthand record created by someone who experienced the event or topic directly. A diary entry fits this best because it is written by a person at the time of the events, capturing their actual observations, thoughts, and details without someone else interpreting them first. It provides direct evidence about a moment in history or a personal experience. A textbook chapter, on the other hand, explains and summarizes information from many sources, which makes it a secondary source. A newspaper editorial expresses opinion about events after they happen, offering interpretation rather than the original event itself. A movie review is also commentary written after watching a film.

Quoting uses the exact words from a source and puts them inside quotation marks to show they are not your own. Paraphrasing restates the same idea in your own words, changing the wording and often the sentence structure while keeping the meaning the same. This distinction matters because quotes preserve the original phrasing, which can be important for tone or authority, while paraphrasing demonstrates your understanding and makes the idea fit smoothly into your writing. Both require credit to the source, but only one keeps the original wording exactly. The other statements don't fit because a paraphrase uses your own words, a quote uses exact words, and quotes aren't necessarily shorter.

3. A character in a short story learns to face a fear after a conflict. What is the character's motivation most likely based on textual clues?

When a character faces a fear after a conflict, the drive shown is usually an inner push to grow and feel more capable. The motivation is to overcome the fear and gain confidence. Text clues often highlight a decision to confront what scares them because they want to prove to themselves that they can handle it, not just escape or please others. That makes the choice self-directed and focused on personal strength. If the text emphasized avoiding fear, the character would likely back away or choose safety rather than press on. If it showed proving themselves to others, the drive would hinge on others' opinions rather than a personal sense of bravery. If it centered on a reward, the motive would be about obtaining something external rather than building inner courage. The emphasis on facing the fear to grow confident best fits the idea of internal change and self-assurance.

If the antecedent is plural, use a plural pronoun (the students would use their). When the pronoun doesn't agree, the sentence can sound odd or be hard to understand, making it unclear who is doing what. It isn't about punctuation or verb tense—it's about making sure the pronoun clearly points to the right noun.

An adverb describes how an action happens and can also describe or modify an adjective. That makes it the best choice because adverbs answer questions like how, when, where, or to what extent for verbs, and they can also intensify or modify adjectives. For example, in "She runs quickly," quickly tells how she runs. In "The plant is very tall," very modifies the adjective tall. Adjectives describe nouns (a tall building), not verbs. Nouns name people, places, or things. Prepositions show relationships (in, on, under) and don't describe verbs or adjectives.

Annotating a text means actively marking what you read and jotting notes in the margins to help you notice and remember important ideas, new words, and questions you have. Noting unfamiliar words helps you build vocabulary and understand the text more fully, and writing down questions in the margins lets you capture areas you want to clarify, which you can revisit after reading. All of this makes reading more interactive and strengthens understanding. Adding extra pages won't connect you to the text itself, so it won't aid understanding. Changing the author's opinions changes the content rather than your comprehension of it. Summarizing aloud without writing misses chances to capture details and revisit them later.

Word choice, or diction, shapes meaning by signaling tone, painting imagery, and guiding how readers interpret the message. The exact words carry connotations—the emotional feel attached to them—so they set the mood of the passage. They also create vivid pictures in the reader's mind when we select precise, descriptive terms, which helps readers see and feel what's happening. And the choice of words can clarify or nuance the message, helping readers understand the author's point more clearly. For example, describing a street as "a quiet, empty lane at dusk" gives a calm, almost lonely mood and a clear image, while "a silent, deserted alley at twilight" might feel more eerie. These nuances show how word choice changes tone and imagery, and in turn how we interpret the overall meaning. It's not about only making sentences shorter or longer, and it doesn't by itself determine the setting; those elements can shift indirectly, but the main effect comes from tone, imagery, and how the message is understood.

In persuasive writing, a claim is the main statement the author wants you to accept. It's the position or idea the author is arguing for, something they want the reader to believe. That's why the best choice says it's a statement the author wants you to accept. The author will then back up that claim with reasons, evidence, or examples to persuade you. Think of a claim like this: "School should start later in the day." That's the claim the author is trying to convince you of; the rest of the text would provide evidence and explanations to support it. The other ideas describe related parts of persuasive writing but aren't the definition of a claim. A conclusion drawn from data is more about what the data show, not the author's main assertion. A fact supported by evidence is something used to back a claim, not the claim itself. A personal opinion with no evidence isn't persuasive, because it lacks support.

Exposition is the beginning part of a narrative that introduces the setting and the main characters, along with some background details the reader needs to understand what's about to happen. It tells you where and when the story takes place, who is in it, and what life is like for them before the main events begin. This setup helps you understand the world of the story and care about the characters, because you know the context and stakes from the start. The climax, in contrast, is the moment when the central conflict reaches its highest point, and the resolution wraps things up and shows how everything ends. The sequence of events describes the plot's progression in order, but exposition specifically focuses on the initial setup—who's involved and where it all takes place. For example, in a tale about a student who discovers a magical attic, the exposition would show the school, the attic's secret, and the student's life before magic changes things. That background makes the later events meaningful and easier to follow.

Saying organization has no impact contradicts the reason for sharing practical steps. Claiming that three strategies guarantee success overstates what the paragraph is delivering. And suggesting that staying organized is impossible clashes with the premise of giving concrete strategies to help you stay organized.
