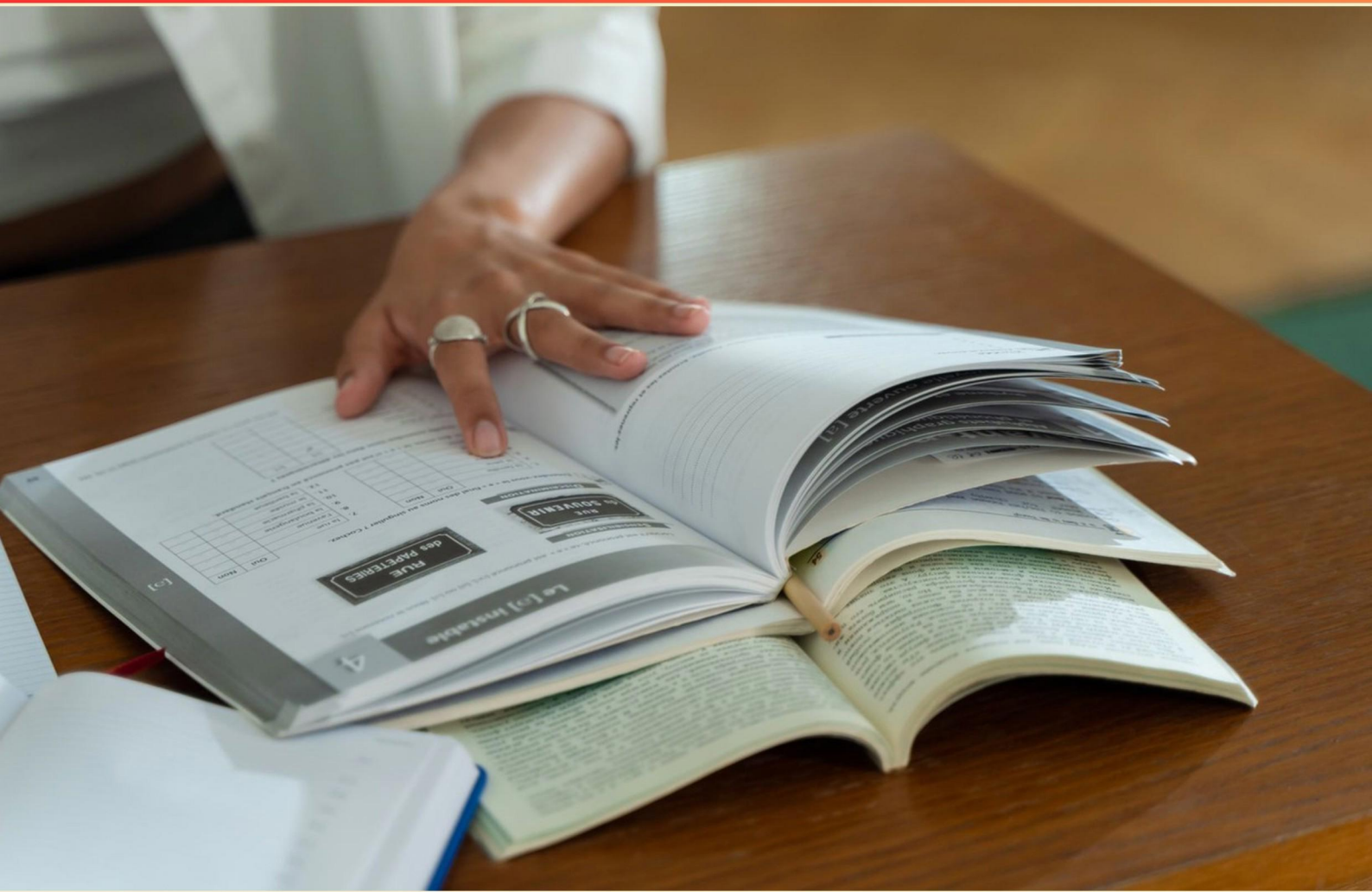

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Explanations

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1. In *The Road Not Taken*, what does the diverging path symbolize?

The diverging path represents the choices we make in life and the direction our life takes as a result. In the poem, a traveler stands at a fork and must decide which road to follow. Choosing one path means leaving the other unexplored, which mirrors how any real-life decision closes off some possibilities while opening others. This is why life choices is the best fit. The symbol focuses on the act of choosing and the impact that choice has on the speaker's future, rather than on fate or destiny being prewritten. Racism and prejudice are clearly present in the situation, and empathy is shown in Atticus's respectful, humane treatment of Tom and Mayella, but the defense itself is most directly about upholding justice within an unfair context. It's the act of challenging injustice through the mechanisms of the law, aiming for a fair outcome even when prejudice makes that outcome unlikely.

Writers in this vein often explore intense personal experience, the sublime in nature, and individual freedom, using lyrical language and evocative imagery. Realism, by contrast, aims to depict everyday life with careful accuracy and detail, focusing on social conditions and the ordinary rather than heightened emotion or imaginative flights. Modernism shifts toward experimental form and structure, often portraying fragmentation, ambiguity, and the complexities of modern consciousness. Dystopia describes a type of imagined future society marked by oppression or catastrophe, not a broad movement defined by emotion and nature.

The key idea here is how power can distort stated ideals. The phrase presents a claimed principle of equality for all animals, but the addition "but some animals are more equal than others" shows that those in charge—the leaders—are rewriting the rule to justify privileges for themselves. It reveals a disconnect between what is professed and what actually happens when those with power shape rules to suit their own interests. This is a sharp critique of leaders who use language to maintain control while eliminating genuine equality, a hallmark of hypocrisy. It isn't about economic planning, strict adherence to laws, or a simple ideal of fairness; it's about the way those in authority manipulate principles to legitimize their unequal treatment of others.

Colors in The Giver signal emotional awareness. In a world kept colorless to enforce sameness, color appears when Jonas begins receiving memories from The Giver. That visual change mirrors an inner growth: Jonas starts to perceive and empathize with others, recognizing moral nuances the community suppresses. So color is a symbol of awakening—an opening to emotions and memories, not memory loss, not numerical order, and not freedom of choice.

The other situations focus on conflicts that aren't with nature—one centers on internal doubt and revenge, another on deception and social concerns, and another on satire about society. These don't place the character in a direct fight against the natural world, so they don't illustrate Person vs Nature as directly.

8. What narrative technique is prominently used in *The Catcher in the Rye*?

First-person narration is the main technique here. The story is told through Holden Caulfield's own voice, using I and me, so readers experience the events through his perspective, thoughts, and feelings as he recalls them after leaving Pencey and wandering New York. This intimate, confessional voice shapes the tone—raw, informal, often digressive—and makes Holden's interpretations and biases central to what readers understand about people and situations around him. Because the narrative is anchored in his single, subjective point of view, we don't get an all-knowing or objective account of every character's inner life, only what Holden chooses to reveal or infers. That's why other options don't fit: an omniscient narrator would know more than Holden could possibly know; an epistolary format would rely on letters or diary entries written to someone; a dramatic monologue would be a speech meant for a performance rather than a personal recollection. The first-person voice is what makes the novel distinctive and immersive.

Symbolism is when a concrete object carries a meaning beyond its literal sense. Diction is about word choice, imagery focuses on sensory details, and a motif is a recurring element; while a motif can carry meaning, the idea of an object standing for something beyond its literal meaning is specifically symbolism.

Why this is the best fit: it names the exact maneuver of altering the opponent's argument to make it easier to dismantle, rather than addressing the real point. For contrast, attacking the person rather than the argument is an Ad Hominem, which targets the speaker, not the argument itself. Propaganda involves biased or persuasive messaging to influence opinions, not specifically this misrepresentation tactic. A Logical Fallacy is a broad category for faulty reasoning, and strawman is a specific example within that category.
